





Englands Navy.

In England's navy lies the protection of her greatness and that she intends to maintain that protection is plainly seen: She is proceeding in the right way to accomplish this. Her estimates of naval expenses for this year was \$93,500,000, or six and a half millions more than last year, and twenty two millions over the year before. It is proposed to begin this year no fewer than ten new ernisers, four of the first, three of the second and two of the third class, besides twenty torpedo-boat destroyers. The second and thirdclass cruisers and one of the first-class will be built in government yards and the others by contract. Thus during this year there will be under construction, in all, ten battle ships of the first-class, six first class, thirteen second-class and two third-elass cruisers, four sloops, and per-haps forty-five to fifty torpedo-boat destroyers. This enormous activity of construction is the more noteworthy in view of the great additions recently made to the British navy. Then there are the vessels repaired and refitted, of which eight were mentioned as to be completed by the end of the then existing financial year, and five others during the calendar


