A FAVORABLE SHOWING.

Hon. Geo. E. Foster, finance minister of Canada, in delivering his budget speech last Friday, again gave practical evidence of his fitness for that high and honorable position.

There were some doubts, even among his warmest friends, regarding his physical fitness for the post of leader in the Commons. There were no doubts re the mental qualities; but ill-health has more or less been a comrade of the capable finance minister during recent months. It is cause for great gratification to all to learn of Mr. Foster's complete restoration to good health, and of his great success in the Budget speech. Never before did he equal this effort. Never were the facts relating to the national finances and trade more clearly and intelligently placed before the public. Never were the preachers of Blue Ruin, the opposition leaders so non-plussed, so helpless to

THE HOSPITAL.

The report presented by Mr. Winters to the council on Monday evening, recommending the erection of an hospital, is a step in the right direction, as it is universally conceded such an institution is urgently required by the town. At the same time, as is well known, the funds are lacking, while to increase the debenture debt to provide the necessary funds is open to grave objections. We would suggest that a few of our leading citizens, say four or five, or if preferable a joint stock company be formed to build and equip the hospital, the council to guarantee a fair rate of interest as may be agreed on, on the outlay with the understanding that at the expiration, say, five or ten years or whatever time may be agreed on the town would take over the property by paying the cost. The foregoing is a brief outline of the scheme of course there are outline of the scheme of course there are many details which could easily be arranged, but the scheme is well worthy of consideration. If a hospital can be built on the lines proposed it will meet the views of all parties; the debt of the town will not be increased at present, and an hospital that is acknowledged by all to be an urgent necessity will be built.

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
