148 Passengers Drownso.

La Spez'a, Italy, July 21.—A terrible accident, resulting in the loss of 148 lives occurred near the month of the Gulf of Spezia to-day. At half past 1 this morning the steamers Ortigia and Maria P. ran into each other, and the latter yearel was so badly damaged that she sank in a very short time. The Maria P. had on board, in addition to her crew, 178 passengers bound from Naples for the River Plate, by far the larger part of whom

were emigrants.

The night was pitch dark when the collision occurred, and the scene on board the sinking steamer almost defies description. Most of the people were asleep in their bunks at the time, and were awakened by the crashing of the steamer's plates, deck beams and planks.

From the reports of the disaster received here, it is impossible to determine whether any attempt was made by the Maria P. to clear away and launch her small beats, but, judging from the accounts given by the excited passengers, it is surmised the steamer went down too quickly to allow this being done, though one boat got away. The blackness of the night added to the terror of those on board, and it is understood that some of the passengers, crazed with fear, jumped overboard.

Sensibilities of France not Conaidered.

Berlin, July 20.—Following yesterday's celebration of the 25th anniversary of the declaration of war by Germany against France on July 19, 1870, the program of the fetes in commemoration of the France-German war includes the celebration of every great German victory and every other great event in connection with the war, beginning with the celebration of the bloody battle at Wisemburg on August 4, and ending with a grand jubilation upon the anniversary of the battle of Sedan on Sept. 1. Large bodies of veterans will go to Wissemburg on the Bayatian frontier of Alsace, to take the Bavarian frontier of Alsace, to take part in the anniversary ceremonies there, and will atterward proceed to the different battlefields for the purpose of reviving old memories. August 14 and 15 will be observed practically as decoration day on the fields of Gravelotte, St. Privat and Mars-la-Tour, when the graves, tombs and monuments of those who perished will be covered with flowers and wreaths by their families and surviving comrades. A congress of the various veterans unions will be held at Strasburg during the fetes, commemorating the fall of that city, when medals struck from the French cannon, which were captured there, will be given to the veterans on behalf of the war office. The railways have agreed to fix an especially cheap rate of fare for the veterans who attend these fetes, and the general public will also get the benefit of occasional cheap trips.
