I purchased this rig on an old Jew, and thought that it would be just the thing for the "poke-out" tramp's road. The hoboes laughed at me and called me "hoodoo," and I never got in with them in any such garb. Nevertheless, I wore it for nearly two months, and so long as it was associated with lazy beggars only, it was all right.
