

### ODD USES FOR PAPER

Good Imitation of Silk.

The cat is acquiring a bad reputation in Brighton. Dr. Newsholme, in his recently issued quarterly report, devotes a separate section to a description of an outbreak of suspicious illamong cats in a particular district of the town, and to a warning against keeping cats which are suffering from certain enumerated symptoms. Dr. Newsholme's attention was called to cats by the fact that in the neighborhood between Elm Grove and Southover street-a part of Brighton inhabited almost solely by the laboring classes—there had been notified a group of cases of diphtheria in the course of a single fortnight, which pointed distinctly to the operation of some local cause.

The patients comprised both children and adults. They did not attend any particular school; there was no community of milk supply; personal infection from case to case could not be traced, and no sanitary defects were found in the affected houses. But in each instance there was a history that the household cat had been ill, fully observed, but it included one or more of the following symptoms: a bad cough, difficulty in swallowing, discharge from the nose, and marked emaciation. In some of the houses the cat had simply been observed to be wasting, and in several instances the head of the household volunteered the surmise that "the cat had been poioned."

In one house, in the centre of the

affected neighborhood, nine live cats lay in the yard attached to this house, with the discharge oozing from its nostrils. In another house a mild case of diphtheria was attributed to the smell arising from a cat which had died in a garden adjoining the house. Four of the emaciated cats referred to above were secured, and necropsy, including a bacteriological examination was made, but with entirely negative results. The illness of the cats in question dated from at least a month before the opportunity for examining them arose, so that the negative result

is not surprising. It will be remembered that Dr. Klein, in his investigation into cat diphtheria, found that the diphtheria infection produced in the cat an acute lung inflammation, the kidneys becoming degenerated in the manner known in even in the acute stage of the disease, there will probably be no exudation in the throat, but only marked pneumonia, and possibly also renal inflammation. The public warning given in Brighton as to cats has had the destred effect, the small outbreak having come to an abrupt termination with the destruction of suspected cats, and of many others whose career has been shortened in consequence of the publicity given to the facts of the case .-

St. Pierre, Ottawa, seconded by delegate Darlington, Montreal:—"That inacmuch as the present achool system is costly and unsatisfactory to the toilers of the land, and further, that it is a channel from land, and further, that it is a channel from which emanates a large amount of the disagreements among the different nationalities and creeds of this country, and, further, that under the present system a workingman's child has no chance of obtaining a fit and proper education so necessary to his future life, therefore, be it resolved, that this congress desire to express itself as being in favor of a free, compulsory, and non-sectarian school for all classes, and that the different provincial governments be petitioned accordingly."

Mr. St. Pierre, who is a French Canadian. and a roman catholic, advocated his resolution on the ground that non-sectarian schools were necessary to create a great nation in Canada,

PRESERVING THE EYESIGHT.

Rules That May be Useful to Those Threatened With Blindness.

A few simple rules carefully obeyed will do much to preserve the eyes in health. Light and color in rooms are important. The walls are best finished in a single tint. Windows should open directly upon the outer air, and light is better when they are close together, not separated by much wail space, not distributed. When at work on minute objects rise occasionally, take a deep inspiration with the mouth closed, stretch the body erect, throw the arms backward and forward, and step to an open window or out into the open air for a moment. Two desks of different height are valuable for a student or writer, one to stand by and the other to sit by. Plenty of open air exercise

is essential to good eyesight. The general tone of the nervous system has much to do with the eyesight. Prolonged or excessive study frequently has pain or poor vision as symptom. The use of tobacco may bring about defective vision and alcohol sometimes destroys it utterly, owing to nerve inflammation that it sets up. City life with shut-in streets and narrow outlook, favors the production of errors in vision. When looking at distant objects the normal eye is at rest. To see near by muscular effort is required. This effort, when constant, changes the shape of the eyeball. After the eighteenth or twentieth year parts of the eye that earlier showed signs of bulging or becoming near-sighted may acquire new strength, and those who escape myopia up to this time are usually free from it after that. The children of near-sighted parents are in special danger. Thy require constant care. It is best to have all children's eyes examined for defects when they are 10 years old.

Near-sight and color-blindness are barriers to the army and navy, to certain fine and mechanic arts and to many industrial pursuits. Their early recognition saves time and money and often prevents the discouragement of defeat. Ounces of prevention are better than tons of cure. There are but few forms of partial or total blindness that were not at one time the reverse of honeless. In view of this fact the duty of parents and guardians is clearly manifest. Ignorance must be replaced by knowledge and carelessness by enlightened forethought. Precaution in the way of type, light, color, rest and exercise, together with occasional calls upon the occulist, will probably secure fair evesight for life.-The Outlook.
