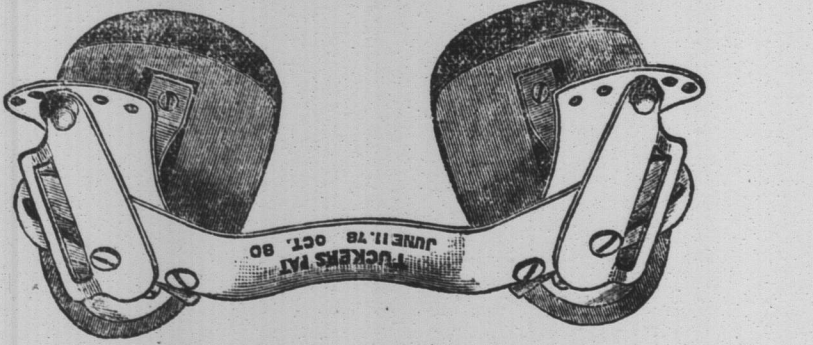

Mixed Wheat Defended.
GRAIN DEFENDABLE TO ONTARIO
 WEATHER—WINNIPEG GRAIN MEN EMPHATICALLY SAY THAT ONTARIO MEN HANDLE LITTLE OF THE CROP, AND THAT LITTLE THEY ADVERTISE—TO PROHIBIT MIXING WOULD KILL THE EXPORT TRADE.
 Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 12.—The report of the proceedings at the annual meeting of the Dominion millers' association in Toronto, Tuesday has been read with interest in official circles. Strong language was used by some of the speakers, language entirely unwarranted by the facts, and which leads to the inference that mental aberration is a quality not confined to Ontario alone.
 To-day the World correspondent had a conversation on this subject with the Hon. J. Wood, controller of inland revenue, and from the information furnished by him it appears that there is another side to the question, differing widely from that put forward at the Toronto meeting. In order rightly to arrive at a correct judgment on the differences between Ontario dealers, millers and the department, there are two or three facts which must be borne in mind.
EASTERN MEN HANDLE LITTLE MANITOBA WHEAT.
 First that of the total Manitoba wheat crop 95 per cent is handled by the Manitoba dealers. In other words, only 5 per cent of the crop of Manitoba passes through the hands of the eastern men. When this fact is taken into consideration, it is not surprising that the force of the strictures of the speakers at Tuesday's meeting.
CANNOT MIX ONTARIO AND MANITOBA GRAIN.
 Second, the only change made in the regulations of this year, as compared with past years, is that in establishing the Manitoba wheat grades, it has been stipulated that "Manitoba" grain consists only of that grown in Manitoba or the territories. This is where the shoe pinches the Ontario men, and to use a phrase, although hackneyed, expression, largely accounts for the milk in the cow's eye. In a previous year the departmental regulations fixed the minimum of red dye which should be contained in Manitoba No. 1 hard wheat at 65 per cent, which must have been grown in Manitoba or the territories. This left a margin of 34 per cent for the Ontario men to work upon. In other words it was possible for them to mix 34 per cent of Ontario soft wheat with the Manitoba product and the grain still be able to pass as Manitoba No. 1 hard. Now this is no longer permissible. With this single exception, there has been no change in the present regulations from those in force for several years past.
