Poland's Capital.

The population of the Polish capital increases at the rate of about 20,000 souls a year. The annual census recently taken gives a total of 571,300, showing an increase of 20,314 during the 12 months. The orthodox Russians form a comparatively small element of the whole population, numbering only 20,871, or very little more than the foreign residents, who are reckoned at 18.000. The Russian element consists, of course, almost entirely of the bureaucracy and petty officials. The Warsaw garrison numbers 37,382 troops of various arms. There are 307,647 Catholics and 190,300 Jews, and it is among the latter that the yearly increase of population is most marked.

It is curious to find in this census return that among the Polish and Russian population of Warsaw there are no fewer than 30,726 persons belonging bility during their life time. Dangers a Chinese Physician Runs in Following His Profession.

Practising medicine in Chinatown is not devoid of dangers. As a rule, the Chinamen are healthy, amazingly so, when one considers how they brave the cold winters in light, loose garments and low shoes. When a Chinaman is taken seriously ill he prepares to die, and there's an end to it. If he doesn't die it isn't his fault, and his friends are more than likely to look on him with suspicion as having cheated the gods by his recovery. Under no consideration, says the New York Sun, would he have an American physician, but as a matter of form his relatives summon a Celestial medico, who does little to influence the case for good or ill beyond making a noise and disturbing the patient. What his medicines are no white man knows, and but few Chinamen outside of the profession.

If the patient dies the doctor is not blamed; if he gets well the doctor takes great credit. 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
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
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
