day and Thursday Mr. O. Higman, of Ottawa, chief electrician of the inland revenue department, and Mr. Wm. Johnson of Belleville, divisional inspector of electric light, were in town fitting up apparatus in the government building for testing electric light and electric light meters. Last session of parliament an act was passed applying to electric light the principles embodied in the weights and measures, and gas inspection act, making it compulsory to have the machines which measure the electric light current, inspected and stamped, same as a weight or measure, and to see that of electric light companies enter into contract, to supply electric light of a certain illuminating quality, that they carry sufficient voltage or horse power to enable them to do so, The value of such an act to the public as well as to the companies is the public as well as to the companies is apparent, the public will have the guarantee that the meters are correct and they will be so sealed that they cannot be tampered with by anyone without its being discovered, the quality of the light will be improved as the companies are required under heavy penalties to keep their apparatus, wires, etc., in good condition; to the companies it creates disinterested parties arbiters, so that disputes between them and the public are referred to the inspecting officer for settlement and as the portable instruments used by the officers are of the very best description, and will be tested for their accuracy quite frequently with standards at Ottawa; it will enable the companies to know much better than they could in any other way whether they are carrying too much or too little voltage.
