There is not a thing produced in this country, from a pan knife to a railway car, that has not been cheapened since the adoption of the national policy. A revenue tariff is always paid by the consumer. If you buy goods not produced in Canada you pay the price of such goods in the country where they were made, with the treight and duty added. The consumer pays that duty. Who paid the duty on tea and coffee when the grits were in power? Why the Canadian consumer paid it. We do not produce those articles and we paid their London price with the duty added—that is a revenue tariff. A revenue tariff is a consumer's tax, a protective tariff is a foreign producer's tax.
