Shortis, Holmes and Durrant all guilty.

Benharrois, Que., Nov. 8.—It seemed as if the whole male portion of the population of this village had turned out on mass and gone to the court house this morning to hear the verdict in the Shortis case.

The judge ascended the bench at 9:10 a.m. After the roll call, the jury were asked if they had found a verdict.

A deathly stillness prevailed and the clerk repeated his question in both English and French.

Judge Mathieu then put the three questions he had left for them to decide upon.

"Did the prisoner murder John Loy on March last?" "Yes."

"At the time of the murder was the prisoner in a state of mind which rendered him incapable of judging the nature and quality of his acts, or knowing that such act or murder was wrong?" "No."

"Is the accused guilty or not guilty?" "Guilty."

During these proceedings the prisoner stood motionless and cold, not a muscle moved. As the assembly arose to leave the court, the prisoner made some enquiries of Dr. Anglin about some music catalogues.

The counsel for the defence say they intend to appeal.

The proceedings consisted of Mr. McMaster's address on behalf of the crown and Judge Mathieu's charge to the jury in French and English.

The jury needed but one ball to reach this decision. The jury retired at 5:45 o'clock at the conclusion of Judge Arnold's charge.

The original session opened in Toronto at 2 p.m. Monday before Judge Ferguson and the first case called was that of the H. H. Mudgett charged with the murder of Willie Wells. The case will likely last three weeks.

The defence has subpoenaed 25 new witnesses and a number of these will give evidence with a view to combating the crucial point of the necessity of proving that a murder was actually committed.

Barrister Horn is prepared to combat the testimony as to the attempt to insure Mrs. Harry Hyams' life, should it be admitted, with a full explanation.

Champions of slavery were always determined free traders. The man who must go to market pays the price of getting there.

A tariff is a tax upon us when levied on goods we cannot produce. If manufacturing is so profitable, why do not free traders undertake it?

In free trade times the constable and the sheriff are always prosperous. What free trade does for agriculture is to convert consumers into competitors.

A tariff for revenue and not for protection, taxes the food of the working man. To buy cheap and sell dear, we must buy raw material and sell finished commodities.

Is it proper for government to maintain a school, and absurd for government to maintain a factory? Taxes on tea and coffee would protect no Canadian industry.

In free trade England there were in 1890, according to a parliamentary return, 1,028 strikes and lock-outs, affecting 389,881 persons.

In the city of Leeds, one of free trade England's great manufacturing centres with a population of over 200,000 not a single workman owns the house which covers his head.

No term prospects from the United States are cheap that tend to leave Canadian farm products rotting in the field, and nothing from Europe is cheap that creates idleness at home.

The number of both sexes employed on the land in England and Wales in 1861, was 2,010,454; in 1891 the number was 980,378 or less than one-half notwithstanding an increase of over 8,000,000 in population.

Let us control our own markets and maintain the opportunities labor has in enjoying the national policy. Any party which does not insist upon giving our own people large opportunities for work is not a party of progress.

A short time ago a meeting of the farmers' club and chamber of agriculture was called at Canterbury, England to consider the motion, "that this club urges the hop or vintners' association to use all means in its power to get a duty imposed on foreign hops," and this was carried by nearly 8 to 1.

If Canada were to adopt free trade the United States and all foreign countries would share the trade done, at present, by Canadians. Is it best for us—to rob our country for the benefit of foreigners, residing or foreign countries.

Since the government controverted elections not care to force there have been seven members of the Dominion parliament disqualified for personal bribery. Of these seven, six were purloining chaps who followed Sir Richard Cartwright and always applauded when he talked about the corruption of the Tories. The seventh was a vile Tory.

Our reform friends claim that our importations would be largely increased by the adoption of the "Free Trade as it is in England." But what does this mean to the Canadian people? Increased importation of articles we make in Canada means diminished production in Canada.

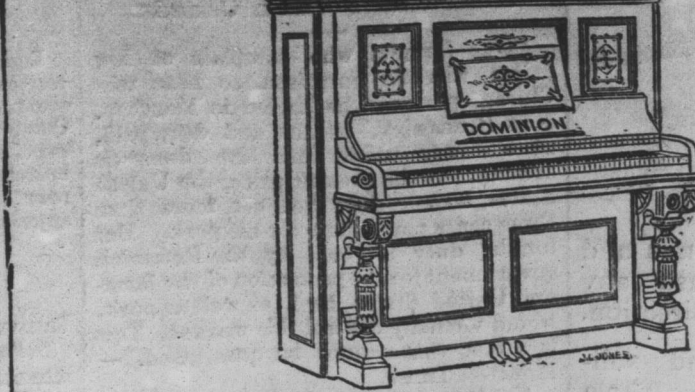
