This expedition had been ordered in consequence of the alarming news which had reached eastern Canada regarding the attempted invasion of Manitoba by O'Neil

Early in October, 1871, rumors of a fenian invasion reached Winnipeg through newly arrived travellers from the south. 

Approaching him in a friendly manner, the fugitive hero dealt him one, straight from the shoulder, that sent him sprawling from his horse, then bounding into saddle, the "general" sped northward over the boundless. The halfbreed recovered himself quickly, enlisted the assistance of a friend and pursued O'Donohue with vengetul thoughts intent. They overhauled him about five miles north of the boundary, bound him securely hand and foot, and took him back to West Lynne, where they gave him in charge to Mr. Bradley, magistrate and collector of customs. Mr. Bradley, for some inscrutable reason, conveyed his prisoner over to Fort Pembina and de-

livered him to Captain Wheaton. Two days after these events 200 French half breeds commanded by Louis Riel and Ambrose Lepine, assembled at St. Bonlface and offered their services to the government to rapel the invaders. They attributed their apparent tardiness to the fact of the difficulty of communication and the distances that many had to travel to reach the rallying point. Governor Archibaid accepted their expressions of loyalty heartily, shaking hands with the leaders, and thanked them in Her Majesty's name for their good intentions. Happily their services were not required the raid was over, and the volunteers returned to their every day life and occupa-

Down east the newspapers were full of the most sensational news and the public the most sensational news and the public were greatly excited. Lt. Col. Osborne Smith was ordered to proceed forthwith to Fort Garry via St. Paul, and organize the local forces, and in the meantime captain Scott was despatched with 200 men, recruited at Montreal and Toronto, to hasten to the rescue by way of the Dawson route—over the same road that general Wolseley had travelled in 1870.

The expedition left Collingwood on Oct. 21 by steamer, and arrived at Thunder Bay on the 24th. 
