Liberal Mismanagement.

In the year 1872-3 the expenditure on the post office and public works depart-ments amounted to \$2,584,051, while the involved a net charge on the treasury of \$414,000. When the liberals had been in power for five years, applying their principles of economy to the public service, the expenditure in these two branches had risen to \$4,196,375, while the revenue was \$3,242,273. Thus the charge imposed upon the treasury in respect of them was increased from \$414,000 to \$954,000,—a rise of 130 per cent.
Another way of putting it is that it cost the people \$1.50 to collect every dollar of new revenue from two principal sources of income during the liberal regime.

Now, what took place after the return of the conservatives to power? Just this: In 1893.4 the expenditure for the two departments had risen to \$7,482.068, with the revenue at \$6,512,086. The deficiency to be made up out of the general funds of the country last year was \$920,000, being \$84,000 less than it was sixteen years ago, when the liberals were in power. Every dollar of new expenditure under conservative rule has been taken care of by increased revenue without the addition of a cent to taxation. In the interval the postal service has been extended through the Northwest, the weight of three-cent letters has been increased from a half cunce to an ounce, the city delivery system has been much enlarged, canal tolls have been reduced and freight rates on government railways

Accounts of Merciless Massacres and Starving People in Turkey.

London, Dac. 14.—A despatch from the correspondent of the United Press in Constantinople, under the date of December 18, says :- Advices received here from Aleppo, under date of Nov. 80, say it has been proved that thirty Armenians have landed with arms and bombs at Hudich and started for Zeltoun. The advices say that this was done with the connivance of the authorities at Hudich.

The representative of the United Press in Constantinople, telegraphing under yesterday's date, says that advices from the interior showed that forced conversions from christianity to mohammedanism are occuring everywhere. Women and children whose husbands and fathers have been killed and whose homes have been destroyed have, rather than lead a life of vagabondage, accepted islamism, whereupon they were housed and fed by the turks. The sincerity of these conversions may be judged from what has occurred in Kaiserea. In this place many women whose protectors had fallen in the massacres were offered their choice between embracing the tenets of the Koran or being either backed to pieces or meeting the worse fate of being kidnapped. Octeneibly the women accepted islamism and thus rendered their lives and perhaps their honor secure. It is now thought Great Britain. If their success would that 1,000 persons were killed in the ds was not satisfied with the death of its victims but vented itself upon the inanimate bodies. The mutilation of the corpses was frightful, and in many cases was of a nature that cannot be described. In Harpoot 70 christians fled to a church in the vain hope that its walls would furnish them a shelter against those who were crying for the blood of Armenians. They were permitted for a time to believe themselves secure, but suddenly the church was surrounded by a great num. ber of Kurds. The doors were then blown in and the christians thought they would be massacred within the sacred structure. They were not. Their captors took them one at a time outside the church and there, headless of the pitiable cries for mercy from the women and children, killed them either by shooting or stabbing them.
