

Facts vs. Imagination.

To the Editor of The Warder A newspaper published not far from here winds up an article commenting on the mistake of putting a "grit" and "patron" candidate in the same constituency with the same old story that has ended every article relating to political subjects in said paper for years, viz. "put the grits in power and everything will boom: farmers and laborers will prosper; there will be no more texation," or words to that effect "ad nauseum." Let us see how history bears out these assertions.

The post office saving bank is emphatically the poor man's saving bank. There the laboring man deposits his small savings. The Macdonald (conservative) minority was defeated in 1878, if I am not mistaker, and the McKenzie (grit) minerity took the reins. The balance on the 30th June, 1873, in the post balance on the 30th June, 1873, in the post office saving banks was \$3 207 051; on the 30th June, 1874, it dropped to \$3,204,965.

That is in the first year of grit prosperity the poor were compelled to withdraw two thousand and eighty six dollars from the post office saving banks. In the second year they were still more beginning to feel the benign (?) influence of grit prosperity, and drew \$278,875 of their savings under the permissions tory rule, and the next year found a still further reduction in the amount at credit, till in 1878 the balance on the 30th June was \$2,754,484 a reduction in the five years of grit rule of \$552,567. But on the 17th of September an election was held and the McKenzie government was defeated and the wicked tories again took office and what do we find ? On the 30th June, 1894, a balance of \$3,105,190, a gain of \$232.80, also that the committee could not \$350,706 in the first nine months, and in the next year a further increase of \$840 479, and so on, increasing every year till 1894, when the balances on the 30th June in that year Report adopted.
