RAILWAY CROSSING.—Mr. E. H. Hopkins went to Ottawa last week to represent the township of Ops, before the railway committee of the privy council. When the matter came before that tribunal Mr. Bell solicitor for the company raised the objection that the committee could take no action until the government engineer had reported on the matter under dispute. The consideration of the case was therefore postponed until the government engineer inspects the crossing and makes his report. Previous to appearing before the committee Mr. Hopkins, Mr. Bell and Mr. Hanford, solicitor and engineer respectively for the G.T.R. were introduced to each other by Major Hughes, M.P., and had a friendly talk as to a settlement, but could not agree, consequently the case had to go before the committee.

The union presbyterian service in the first presbyterian church on Christmas morning had more of a war tone than usual on such occasions. Rev. Robt. Johnston of St. Andrew's, spoke of "the possibility and possible blessing of war," between Britain and United States. The substance his remarks were to the effect that there were worse enemies threatening the Anglo-Saxon race than war, these were "mammonism" or the worship of wealth and that which ever follows this "quartz" to us. These are deadly serpents being warmed in the bosoms of Britain and the American republic, and yet sucking from these nations their life blood. God will save these nations for the sake of the world, said the preacher, and if war should come it will be a merciful judgement by the lesser destruction. He may say them from the greater. Rather would he hear the leaders "Cry havoc and let slip the dogs of war," and see the young men of our land pacing the quaterdeck, keep long sentinels at night, and going to learn on the battlefield lessons of hardness, of bravery, of loyalty and of unselfishness, and see them die learning these lessons that he would see them emulate and effeminate bowing in ease-loving and luxurious worship at the shrine of Mammon.—London "Echo."
