

Parliamentary Notes.

Certain political heelers in Toronto and Ottawa are making themselves very busy writing letters for electors in the various ridings to write to their representatives in parliament urging support to this or that side of the Manitoba School Question. It transpires that a systematic plan has been carried out by two rings of fakirs, one threatening dire destruction in case the vote be cast for the bill, and the other seeking to influence for the measure.

Such meddling on the part of heelers is most reprehensible, and has a tendency to drive men to the opposite extreme. As a rule the appeals to support the Government come from honest meaning persons who fear seeing the defeat of the grand old party.

On the other hand, many urging opposition to the Bill are influenced by

proper motives but the great majority of them are mere fakirs, heelers, of no standing in either Toronto or Ottawa. They are the creatures of a few designing selfish schemers. Their influence is indeed very injurious. Their improper attempts unduly to influence men, who would certainly have opposed the measure, have resulted in turning several for the remedial bill. Personally such persons have not affected the course of North Victoria s member. His mind has leng since been made up; his course clear. He stands second to none in Canada in having resorted to friendly efforts to settle the question, by having Manitoba herself remove the grievance admittedly existing there. But separate schools should never be re-established. There has never been any deviation from the one line. A commission should be appointed, he says, to inquire. He concluded by moving that "the bill be read this day six months." Does he expect to be in power on that date?
