

Tae Quebec G-zette, of 21st May, 1767. relates that :- "On Surday next, divue service, according to the use of the church of Eugland, will be at the recollets' church, and continue for the enmmer season, eginning oon after eleven. The crum will beat each Sanday soon after balt an hour past ten, and the recollets' bell will ring, to give notice of the English service, the instant their own is ended."

Toronto. Again, in its issue of 13th August. Inglie, bishop of Nova Scotta, held his primary visitation in the recollets' church by the Rev. Phil ip Toosey, minister of the parish. The services of the church of England were regularly conducted in the recollets' church until its destruction by fire on 6th September, 1796, when they were then held in the jesuits' chapel, until the cathedral was consecrated on 28th August, 1804.


