

It is Not a Fixed Point as Common Be

lief Imagines It to Be. access to the very centre of the earth, and there, with a tube long enough to reach the surface, look at the spot in the heavens known as the Celestial Pole, the point at which our tube protruded would be the North or the South Pole, according as we viewed the North or South Celestial Pole. It is evident that our line of sight would be along the celestial axis and that part of it within the earth would be

the axis of the earth. But here is a curious matter: The position of the celestial north pole, and consequently of the celestial south pole, is not a fixed point among the constellations. At present the north pole lies in the constellation of the Little Bear, Centuries ago it was a point in the Dragon, and it is worth stating that the long, slanting tunnel of the Great Pyramid of Egypt is made to point to a star in that constellation. The supposition is that this tunnel was a means of observing the Pole Star at the time the pyramid was built. Calculation shows that this period was either 2160 B.C., or 3410 B.C., for the next earlier epoch at which the pole lay in the constellation of the Dragon was about 23,000 B.C. In this way a study of the pole leads us to the date of the pyramid. Twelve thousand years hence the north pole of the heavens will be no longer in the Little Bear, but in the constellation of the Lyre. The truth is that, supposing the axis of the heavens to be a line, this line traces among the constellations a circle whose diameter is more than half a right angle.— Robert Blight.

Farm Fences. Temporary wooden fences are oftentimes convenient. Posts, rails and stakes should be of cedar, when practicable, to secure lightness and durability. Oak, ash and hackmetack are kinds of wood that remain sound a good while. Fence boards or slabs of pine or hemlock, if kept up from the ground, will last a long time. Poles of brown ash, red oak or white maple are slow to decay. Hedge fences through woodlands are easily made, but require frequent repairs. For a few years past more wire fences have been built than of any other kind, These are cheap, quickly constructed and very effectual. They are especially adapted to the roadside, as they do not cause drifting. With regard to fences, as well as many other things, the best are the cheapest and one mark of a model farmer is to keep his fences in good repair.

The New Bordeaux Mixture. M. Michael Perret of France, gives the following mixture in lieu of the old Bordeaux mixture: "Add 4 pounds of copepr and molasses; of water 22 gallons." The molasses, which constitutes the main distinction between the old and the new, is used to give it more adhesiveness to the leaves. He advises to "add the mo lons of water, then slack the lime and add 4 1-2 gallons of water to form a milk of lime. Pour this slowly into the sweetened water, stirring briskly in order to mix intimately. Next, in a third and wooden vessel, dissolve the bluestone and pour this mixture, stirring well."

Beginning Beekeeping. Beekeeping is a useful study and one that will assist very materially in opening the door to nature's grand storehouse full of wonders and surprises. The beginner needs, first of all, to get one or more of the several standard works on apiculture and study them thoroughly.
