There is indeed in England to day a very strong, and I am told, a rapidly growing, section of the people in tavor of discrimination in favor of the colonies. The action of Canada, the expression of her parliament and press at the time of the Venezuelan trouble, has called forth the loudest praise. The out-spoken loyalty of Canada seems to have aroused the clearest echo in the hearts of the British people at home. 
