New Commissioner.

Canada's new high commissioner to England has been appointed and none of the men whose names have been so frequently mention. ed in that connection got the position. Rumor has seldom, if ever, connected the name of Sir Donald Smith with the high commission. ers office for it was not thought he could leave his large business interests in this country to take up a permanent residence in England. But nevertheless, Sir Donald was selected to assume Sir Charles Tupper's recent duties at meeting of the cabinet council held Monday

The name and fame of the new high comioner are known to every Canadian for Sir Donald has been a prominent figure both in public and financial metters. He has been for 35 years prominently connected with Canadian politics. Sir Donald was born in Morayahire, Scotland, in 1821 and is now 75 years of age. He married Isabella Hardisty, daughter of Richard Hardisty of the Hudson's Bay Company and spent his early years himself in the employ of the Fur Trading company and since 1888 has held the office of resident govenor in Canada. Sir Donald is one of the most prominent directors of the Canadian Pacific railway and president of the bank of Montreal. He first sat in the house of commons for Selkirk, on the admission of Manitoba into the price in 1271. into the union in 1871. Was re-elected in 1872 and 1874. In 1878 his election was voided and he was unsuccessful at a by-election. Has represented Montreal west since 1887. Sir Donald has generally been classed as an independent conservative. Sir Donald is an honorary D. C. L. of Cambridge univer-

No School Trustees in New York.

New York, April 27 .- (Special)-Gov. Morton to-day signed the compromise school bill abolishing school trustees in New York City. The new law provides that the city shall have a city superintendent of schools, a superintendent of school buildings, and inspectors of common schools. The board of education is to consist of twenty-one commissioners of common schools, to be appointed by the Mayor. In November of each year the Mayor is to appoint seven commissioners

The board of education has the power to appoint the city superintendent and to fix his salary, also to name the super-intendent of school buildings, who is to be an architect. The ward trustees are to be abolished on June 13, 1896.

The Mayor is authorized to appoint five inspectors of common schools in each school inspection district, the district to be designated by the board of education.
