The mining engineer of the Dominion Geological survey presents a careful summary of the mineral poducts of Canada for the past year (1895). In some cases the returns are necessaily estimated but these estimates are approximate. The total value reaches the sum of \$22,500,000 the largest return made in the history of Canada. The second in rank being \$20,900,000 in 1894. Coal leads with a return of \$7,774,178, with gold in the second place with an output of \$1,910,921. The other metals in order of value are:—Nickel, \$1,360,984; silver, \$1,158,633; copper, \$949,229; lead, \$749,966; iron ore, \$238,070, and mercury, \$2,343. The output in petroloum ranks next to coal in the non-metallic products, it being \$1,201,184. Classed with petroleum are:—Natural gas, \$432,032; asbestos, \$268,175; gypsum, \$202,708; salt, \$180,417; coke\$143,047, mineral water, \$111,048, and pyrites, \$102,594. In comparison with other; years there is a decided increase in the output of structural materials and clay products. In brick, building stone and lime the estimates are respectively, \$1,800,000, \$1,200,000 and \$900,000. Next in value come sewer-pipe and tiles, at \$257,045 and \$200,000. Terra cotta ranks next value come sewer-pipe and tiles, at \$257, 045 and \$200,000. Terra cotta ranks next with an output of \$195,123. Pottery, \$125, 900, sands and gravels, \$118,359, and Portland cement, \$111,680 are other important items.
