Fatherhood is a most sacred function. In this life alone its exercise is fraught with measureless results for good or evil; considered in view of the endless life on which all men have entered, the possibilities and results are beyond conception or computation. The ignorance and indifference which abound among menotherwise well informed—concerning fatherhood and its obligations are startling and criminal; while the wickedness which degrades this function to the low level of aninalism is a shameful badge of degradation.

It is a sad commentary on this ignorance and indifference that men lead ignorance and indifference that men lead in social impurity, regardless of their higher duties and holy responsibilities. They furnish the money which creates the commercial power of this evil. Enough will be offered upon the altar of lust in this city to-night to build many churches and relieve thousands who are in distance. The force of animalism turn in distress. The fires of animalism turn the forces which belong to pure father-hood to bitterness and ashes. The history of social vice is the history of deprayed manhood. Under the false and oruel "double standard" of morality which has shielded men and trampled on women, men have been the greatest sufferers as well as the greatest sinners against themselves, their sisters and the God of purity. 

The ideal father is the ideal upwardlooking and upright-walking animal, the true Authropos, and not the lustful beast. The earthly dwelling place of the immortal one, which has so to do with character and soul development, should be well born. Hence no man is at liberty to be content with low intellectual powers or attainments. He is bound to make the most of himself and for himself for the sake of those who may be born to him through fatherhood. He should seek that which is highest in thought, richest in intellect and noblest in conception, touching all things, all questions, all duties. To be indolent and non thoughtful is to fall below all real manhood. To be content with medicerity is to be worthy of condemnation. To labor continually that he may attain higher heights of know-ledge and of intellectual culture is the least a man can do if he would be true to his possible mission as a father.
