It was a noble act of a noble girl, and it should not be allowed to go unnoticed. Let the people of this community subscribe a couple of hundred dollars wherewith to secure a becoming testimonial to this youthful martyr. This brave girl did not wait to consider her own danger; it was enough for her to know that a human life was in her own baby sister's hands, and so this chivalrous young soul rushed to the rescue and made a gallant attempt to save the child. In the attempt two lives were sacrificed and the world lost a noble and brave girl. Such a monument will testify what Canadian girlhood is capable of in the hour of supreme danger-when life is cheerfully thrown into the balance rather than see a despairing creature perish without attempting a rescue."
