STURGEON POINT HOTEL BURNED.—When the news came via telegraph from Fenselon Falls that the Sturgeon Point hotel was under excitement and concentration reigned supreme among the cottage owners in town. Many employers sent down men to fight the flames, while others drove, went by bike or in canoes the scene of the fire. The few workmen there, however, had done good work, the fire being confined to the hotel and a few trees around. The fire originated from the upsetting or exploding of a lamp in the cellar and very soon the hotel and pavilion were burned, with the most of their contents to the ground. At one time Senator Debon's cottage was in extreme danger of burning but we are pleased to state escaped. The fire will make an unsightly appearance of what was at one time the most beautiful part of the Point. Mr. E. 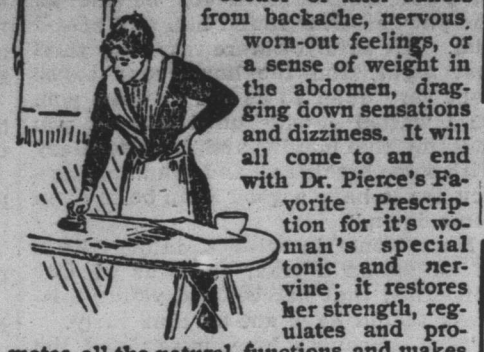

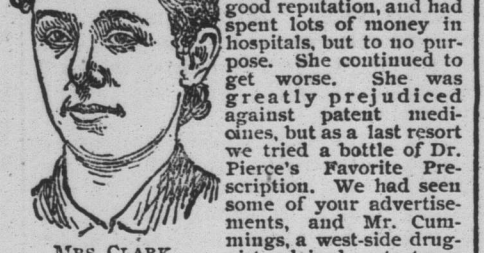

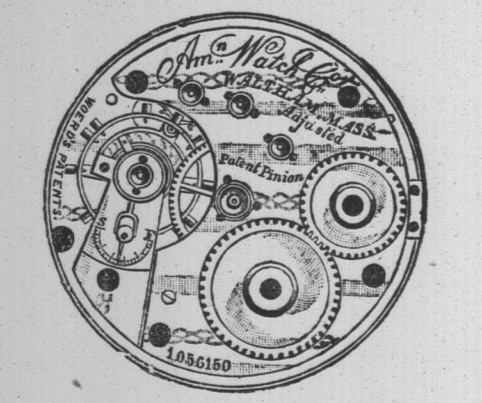
