### The Fenelon Falls Fire.

HOWRY & SON'S LUMBER YARD SUFFERS NEARLY ONE QUARTER OF A MILLION LOSS.

The bright reflection in the northern sky last Friday night caused considerable comment on the streets, but when the news was flashed across the wires that Howry & Son's large lumbering concern was on fire, excitement was at its highest pitch. In a short time the Lindsay brigade boarded a special together with some 150 Lindsayites, and made the run of 16 miles to the Falls in the remarkable time of 16 minutes.

At the Falls the Lindsay men were given the task of saving the mills and right nobly they did it. The Peterboro and Bobcaygeon ladders were stationed at other points along the fire to keep it from spreading. Fortunately they too were successful. The excitement of the Fenelon Falls people, the roaring of the flames, the shooting, leaping tongues of fire, the wierd and fantastic scene, all these and much more are beyond description. About four o'clock in the morning the fire was under control and it was then that destructive as had been its ravages, it was seen at its proudest in the artist's standpoint. The 15 or 20 acres of burning waste with its flames 4 or 5 feet high looked like an immense golden colored field of waving, tempest tossed grass.

Poetry under such circumstances however was lost sight of, when it was remembered that 13 to 15 million feet of lumber was burnt, estimated value at \$200,000 to \$240,000 fully insured. The stock burned was principally 1 1/2 and 2 inch selected pine put out for export and most of which was sold to be shipped as soon as dry. There was also nearly 6 million shingles, 3 million 1 1/2 and 3 thousand cords of wood burned.

The origin of the fire is unknown except that it was first discovered in a small barn which stands close to the yard and which had presumably been occupied by children during the afternoon. Howry & Son will at once rebuild their tracks, their mill having started next day and will continue to run night and day during the season.

### The Triumphant March.

The most enthusiastic friends of Major Sam Hughes could not but have been satisfied if they had witnessed the warm welcome accorded him on his return from North Victoria via Fenelon Falls and Cameron to Lindsay. Although but little time was given to organize a procession, we may safely say that seldom, if ever, has a member elected been received with greater enthusiasm than was manifested on Wednesday. The North Victoria procession, in which was represented every section of the constituency, was met a few miles from Lindsay by a long train of the Major's overjoyed friends in the south. With colors flying, two brass bands playing, whistles blowing and hundreds of people cheering, the procession quite took the town by surprise about 12.30 noon. After "rousing her up" in great style down Kempt street the long array gathered in at the market square. Major Hughes in a few well chosen words thanked the people for the magnificent reception they had tendered him. Three times three and a tiger for North Victoria, Sam Hughes and the Queen, brought the demonstration to a close.

### Grand Jury Presentment.

The grand jury of the assizes now in session brought in their presentment on Thursday evening. It was read by the foreman as follows: May it please your Lordship—The grand jurors of our sovereign lady the queen, assembled at the sittings of her majesty's high court of justice for the county of Victoria beg to express our great and our joyful satisfaction for the clear and concise statement of the law relating to the crime of murder and of an accessory to that crime, contained in your address at the opening of the court. In obedience to our lordship's instructions we have visited the county gaol. The premises are in a cleanly and satisfactory condition and all the requirements for a prison appear to be fully complied with. There are at present nine prisoners—eight males and one female. Of these, one male and the female inmate are held as being insane; two under sentence for larceny; one awaiting trial for burglary; one vagrant; one under sentence for indecent assault; one for murder and one for being accessory to murder after the fact. The county has for many years been free of cases of violent taking of life; the case of murder now being tried has therefore given a great shock to a community which has happily for so long a period been exempt from the perpetration of so heinous a crime. We desire to express our appreciation of the courteous and helpful assistance rendered to us in the discharge of our duty by the learned gentlemen who are conducting the business of the crown at this court. ### FENELON FALLS.

Special to The Warbler. SALVATION ARMY. Captain Montenegro visited Fenelon Falls barracks on Monday, June 29th, with illustrated lantern lectures, entitled "Life of Mrs. Booth." The local corps are having an excursion to Sturgeon Point on Dominion day, by steamer Greyhound.

The largest blaze ever witnessed in Fenelon Falls, took place last Friday night, when about half of the contents of the large lumber yard of the Howry firm was consumed. The fire broke out about eight p.m., in or near Mr. P. Sova's stable, and rapidly spread to the adjacent lumber piles. Mr. Howry was in Port Hope and Mr. Swan, business manager of the firm and Mr. Seely superintendent of the firm were enjoying a row in Cameron lake. When they perceived the flames, and at once came down the lake at a break-neck speed. These two gentlemen and their assistants acted with great promptness and between the hours of ten and eleven o'clock two special trains had arrived, one bearing the Lindsay fire brigade, with their hose, and the other bringing a steam fire engine from Peterboro; and at a later hour a steam fire engine came in from Bobcaygeon by boat. Thanks to this assistance the fire was extinguished before all the lumber was consumed, and thus prevented from spreading to the mill or box factory. The wind was favorable, blowing from the mill towards the street, serving great credit for their exertions, as had the mill once caught, the probabilities are that the front street at least, if not other streets as well, would have been in ashes. Mr. Swan exerted himself so greatly that he was seized with a nervous attack about mid-night and lay unconscious for four hours, but thanks to great efforts he was able to be conveyed home in the early morning and is now quite recovered. The heavy loss to the firm is we understand partially covered by insurance.

The 23rd of June passed quietly in our midst, although it was well understood that both parties were working hard and the many warm friends of Mr. Hughes have reason to feel proud with him of the magnificent victory he scored over such terrible odds. They all wish him every success now as heretofore, and a large number regret being unable to attend his triumph in Lindsay on Wednesday.
