A New Survey.

The cards which are issued by the Registrar-General of Ontario, are in the form of a postal card, the information being on one side and the address on the other. When the card is filled and dropped into the postoffice letter box it goes free, being granted by the Postmaster

The birth registration card must contain the following information: Name. Sex and date of birth. Name of father.

Maiden name of mother. Occupation of father. Physician in attendance. Remarks. Date of return

Name of sex. Date of death, Where born. Causes of death and length of illness.




