Several parties from Lindsay have gone to the north country to pick berries. It is just probable that the latter fruits will be selling at what sellers' think pretty good prices. The heavy fruit growers of the Niagara districts have combined. A joint-stock company is the result under the management of E. B. Smith and Carpenter and Sons. It is the intention of the company to grade prices and not to glut the markets as has been the case other years. Buyers need not be alarmed however that famine prices will rule, as in all probability the company will endeavor to act in all fairness to both buyers and sellers. Several Lindsayites are in the north country buying berries for local and foreign sellers. Some are working on commission, others are speculating.
