A meeting largely representative of the business interests of the town assembled in one of the parlors of the Benson House yesterday morning to meet Mr. W. H. Lockhart, Gordon of Toronto, representing the citizens committee to consider the James Bay railway project. Mr. Lockhart-Gordon pointed out the three different routes proposed viz: the South Sea route, the Lake Nipissing route and the Haliburton route. Of course only the latter could be of any benefit to this town. The Haliburton route would be a prolongation to Ottawa of the present Haliburton line and thence east of Lake Temiscamungue to James Bay. It would be of advantage to Lindsay only in so far as it opened up the country between here and Mattawa and give a direct connection with Manitoba and the N.W.T. for all the trade to James Bay would necessarily be for Toronto only. A committee was appointed to consider the matter with the Toronto committee. It consisted as follows:—Col. Deacon, Robert Smyth, Mayor-elect Taylor, Wm. Flavelle, Wm. Grace, Wm. Steen, B. J. McLaughlin, T. Stewart. On motion of Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Steen, it was decided that those present at this meeting desire to express their approval of the scheme to construct a railway from Haliburton to Mattawa as a link in the railway to James Bay, and in the event of a meeting, this is the best of all proposed routes in the interest, not only of the town of Lindsay, but of the country at large.

Mr. Lockhart-Gordon met a similar gathering in Kingston last night and thence returned to Toronto. He proposed to visit other towns along the proposed route to join their influence with the government as well.

Manchester, Eng., Jan. 3.—The Manchester Guardian today says:—"The government has categorically stated that Great Britain will refuse to recognize any special rights granted to any Chinese port or any particular power. Any port opened to one power must be open to all, or open to none. If Russia has been granted the right to winter ships at Port Arthur, Great Britain will enforce her rights to the same privilege, and her ships will winter there, whether China consents or does not concede the right." Continuing, the Manchester Guardian remarks:—"If Germany obtains a naval station at Kia-Chau, Great Britain insists upon having a lease of ground for a naval station at the same port, and she will support every other power making the same claim. The contention of the Government is that the most favoured nations clause in the British and all other treaties with China forbids any special concessions of the nature contemplated by Germany at Kia-Chau, and prevents nations from acquiring special benefits in which the others have not a share. The Government has also declared that the same principle applies to such transactions as railway and mine monopolies. Taking her stand on the knowledge such concessions, and will insist on similar railway and mine rights, and will use such force to secure or defend them as may be necessary. 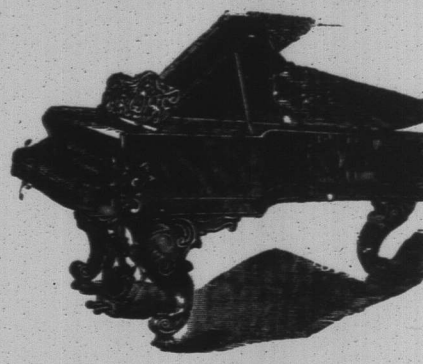
