The end of the session. For seven weeks have the members of the Legislature been tied to their posts in Toronto. For seven weeks the big staff of sessional servants have been fattening at the public crib, and some of them have scarce seen the inside of the parliament buildings. Of those who did, quite a detachment spent their time in the concoction of campaign literature, culled from the very speeches which, in these letters, have been before marked out as for that purpose. The whole session has been a farce for the purposes of legislation. The government have assiduously devoted themselves to the voting of money for expenditure in the riding where it would do most good, and to the careful burking of all enquiries from the members of the opposition.

Let us look just at the last week of it and consider in brief the important doings of the house during the last week of the session. First in order came the bill to amend the Lord's Day act. The government measure at the instance of Sam Blake, J. J. McLaren, et al. A deputation pointed out to the government faults of the bill, and they withdrew it because they were afraid to railroad through the house such a measure as they rushed through during the dying hours of the last session. The government put up Hon. E. J. Davis, their methodist member, to excuse them, but his explanations were halt and maimed. Then Mr. Whitney took them to task for cowardice. At that they laughed, but it was a sore blow to them when Mr. Thomas Gibson, a liberal who for 27 years has sat in the house, condemned the government strongly, and patron Haycock, their friend and supporter, told the house the government had evidently intended the bill for a joke.

The climax of the piggery case came when German, the big government bully from Welland who was unseated and disqualified from sitting in the Ottawa house, chose to apply to St. John words which no man may put in print and in a most insulting way dragged Mrs. St. John's name into the case. St. John is a man of some six feet four, and carries about with him 250 pounds of muscular avoirdupois. It is his boast that he can turn a handspring. He could have thrown German out of the window. He might have subjected him to any physical indignity he chose; but he very properly declined to soil his hands with German, who certainly ought to thank his lucky stars that St. John's temper is not like his own, in which case he would have met with swift punishment for his indecency.

Another point to notice is that when the railway bonus bill was in committee, Mr. Carnegie moved an amendment that all persons employed on railways getting government grants should employ none but British subjects. The government members defeated the amendment. Mr. Whitney moved that all such employees should be British subjects or of one year's residence in Canada. Andrew Pattulo took oceasion to condemn such retaliation upon his Yankee friends, and Mr. Whitney's amendment was voted down, greatly to Mr. Pattulo's glee. The ardent spirit of this bumptious young man were somewhat quenched when in the 3rd reading of the bill, Mr. Hardy told German to introduce an amendment to provide that employees of bonused rail reading of the bill, Mr. Hardy told German to introduce an amendment to provide that employees of bonused railways must not be citizens of any country having an alien labor law that bars out Canadians. The government evidently took this step against their will, and solely because Mr. Whitney and his friends forced them to take it, something which should not be forgotten when you go to mark your ballot.

Just a word in conclusion. Mr. Whitney made an attempt to have the timber manufacturing clause put in force at once, and failed. The plan is to let the Ottawa government defeat the clause on the ground that it is ultra vires, and then the Ontario government can go to the people

Ontario government can go to the people and say it wasn't their fault.

It is a beautiful record, this session of government fiascos and follies. Backdown from the principles they protested they desired to embody in law and deliberate use of their majority to prevent the opposition from getting at the truth which would have supported their contentions, have characterized the government's proceedure throughout the entire session. Surely the people will not be so blind as to deny the facts. Surely all men are not fools. Surely to not even a narrow majority of the electors of Ontario can this term be applied. In the light of the respect which is due the intelligence of the people, it is difficult to believe that the result of the coming election will not be victory for James Pliny Whitney and economical and honest administration of public moneys.




