



Washington, March 25.—The Court of Enquiry appointed to investigate the cause of the Maine disaster has reported that the loss of the battleship was due to an outside explosion. The State Department, by direction of the President, has cabled United States Minister Woodford at Madrid to notify the Spanish Government of this conclusion.

The Spanish Government has cabled officially to Washington that the Spanish naval commission holds the disaster to the Maine to be of internal origin. The Government of Spain, it can be stated positively, is not disposed to turn back the torpedo flottilla now proceeding from the Caparics, and would be distributed to consider a suggestion from this Government tending to interfere with the disposition by Spain of her own torces. War preparation on an unprecedented scale is being hurried to completion by the Way and Navy Departments, and the country practically is on a war footing.
