Trent Valley Canal.

The following circular has been sent out by the re-organized Trent Valley Canal

PETERBOROUGH, June 4th, 1898.

DEAR SIR,—At a meeting of representatives of the municipalities along the line of the Trent Valley Canal, held in Peterborough ar borough on June 1st., inst., it was decided to re organize the Trent Valley Canal As-sociation. It was recognized that it was necessary in the interest of the early com-pletion of this most important work to

The work now under contract will soon be finished—probably before the end of the year, and in order that the canal through out may be completed at an early date, and that the people may receive the full benefit of the money expended, provision should be made by the Dominion Parliament for placing the remaining sections under contract. The Dominion Government, through the Premier and the Minister of Railways and Canals, has unmistakably given the people to understand that it regards the canal as a work that should completed. We however, in this dis trict, so fully recognize its importance to the district and to the country as a whole, that we should neglect no available means of urging upon the Government and Par-liament the necessity for pushing the work

ithout relaxation. We must recognize, however, that there is opposition to the completion of the canal—opposition that is no doubt selflis, but which has influence—and we must take such steps as we can to not only urge the Government to push the work forward, but also to strengthen its hands in so doing. To accomplish this it is necessary that the members of the Government, the members of Parliament, the influential Boards of country, should be made familiar with the route of the causa, its feasibility, its advantages and the great benefit it would be to the carrying and consequently the

general trade interests of the country, and of the large and populous district more immediately interested.

At the meeting referred to the opposition which has shown itself in the Toronto Board of Trade and in Parliament, and the whole position of the caral project, was thoroughly considered, and it was unanimously agreed that the Association should at once be resuscitated to carry on a vigourous educational campaign in favour of the early completion of the canal, and to secure the early letting of contracts for the work required on the remaining sections. A resolution to that effect was adopted. and it was resolved that all wardens o of counties, mayors of towns, reeves of of townships and villages, representatives of Boards of Trade interested, members of Parliameu; and of the Legislature through whose constituences the canal passes, and officials of the Association, should be mem-bers, with power to add to their number. Protect the Birds.

The reports from northern districts of the province in regard to a plague of Trade, the press and all leaders of public opinion and in trade throughout the of C P.R. trains as a result of crushing myriads of the pests on the rails should induce all who have any authority to strictly enforce the provisions of the law for the protection of insectivorous birds. The only effective means of fighting insect peats is by sparing their natural enemy, the birds. If school teachers and school inspectors would warn their pupils against robbing birds' nests of eggs or destroying the young and at the same time point out how useful the birds are as an ally of the farmer they would do the community an important service. Certain privileges for the collection of birds' eggs for strictly scientific objects may be secured through the game wardens, but it is unlawful to have in one's possession without such a permit either the eggs or young of any bird save eagles, hawks, owls, wild pigeons, blackbirds, kingfishers, crows, ravens, jays and sparrows. - Peterborough
