OPS.

The Ops. Council met on Monday evening for adjournment on 21st ult. at the usual hour. All members present. The minutes of last regular meeting were read, and on motion by Messrs. Hopkins and O'Connell were duly confirmed.

COMMISSIONERS

From Mr. F. Knowlton, town clerk, with a copy of a resolution passed by Lindsay Council, asking the cooperation of Ops Council to prevent undue encroachment on the jurisdiction of bathers along the shore. From the F. C. C. association, soliciting the aid and influence of Ops Council in regard to the work of construction. The Clerk explained that some ratepayers had paid estate labor money to him, that he had handed it over to the Treasurer who would pay it out to sundry pathmasters on their presenting a regular order for the same.

Mr. Curries then moved, seconded by Mr. O'Connell, that the Reeve issue orders on the Treasurer in favor of pathmasters in whose boats money has been paid in compensation for estate labor. Carried.

Mr. Lee, owner of east half lot 38, claimed thirty dollars compensation for undermeasuring about 10 rods of the same.

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motion by Messrs. Curries and O'Connell, and to Mr. Hickson's appropriation. Mr. E. M. Agnew desired that a piece of ditching be done along the 5th gr. line, con. S. to allow the water to escape from his drain. Mr. Curries thought about two dollars would pay for the work. Mr. Agnew required it well done, and reluctantly agreed to do it himself to insure its being done quickly.

The Reeve and Deputy Reeve said they had made an inquiry about the breaking of Mr. Meahan's wagon, referred to at last meeting, and the following resolution was passed. Moved by Mr. Curries, seconded by Mr. Hickson, that after having duly considered the circumstances under which Mr. J. Meahan's wagon was broken on 4th gr. line, 14th con., we are of opinion that he has no claim on the township for loss sustained by the break. Carried.

The Reeve testified that Mr. Clancey, owner of 21 lot 7, con. A, had built 120 rods of approved wire fence where much labor had been often necessary in winter to keep the road open. Mr. Hopkins moved, seconded by Mr. Curries, that Mr. Clancey be allowed 20c. per rod for said fence, in conformity with by-law No. 20. Carried.

Mr. O'Connell, that the members of Ops Council are in full accord with those of Lindsay Council in their desire to stop the barbarous conduct of certain youths who shock the senses of sight and hearing with a profane and impudent language, and we shall inflict the penalty prescribed by law No. 47 against such offenders when opportunity offers. Carried.

By motion by Mr. Curries, seconded by Mr. O'Connell, orders amounting to \$12.87 were issued by the Reeve in payment of accounts just passed, and on motion by Messrs. Curries and Hickson, the council adjourned to meet at 10 a.m. on August 13th next. W. F. O'DOVER, Clerk.

Terrible Calamity. One of the greatest marine catastrophes of the past twenty years occurred on Tuesday evening of Sable Island situated about 100 miles due east of Halifax, which is directly in the track of trans-Atlantic steamers from Liverpool to Halifax and other ports, and has earned so unenviable a reputation among sailors as to be termed "the graveyard of the Atlantic." The locality is noted as being the scene of all most perpetual fogs, touching as it does the southern extremity of the banks of Newfoundland. At a late hour Tuesday night the sailing ship Cromartyshire collided in the fog with the French liner La Bourgeoise carrying a full complement of 600 passengers and crew. Five hundred were drowned, only two hundred of the passengers being rescued.
