Terrible Calamity.

One of the greatest marine catastrophes of the past twenty years occured on Tues-day evening of Sable Island situated about 100 miles due east of Halifax, which is directly in the track of trans-Atlantic steamers from Liverpool to Halifax and other ports, and has earned so unenviable a reputation among sailors as to be termed locality is noted as being the scene of almost perpetual fogs, touching as it does the southern extremity of the banks of Newfoundland. At a late hour Tuesday night the sailing ship Cromartyshire collid-ed in the fog with the French liner La Bourgogne carrying a full complement of 600 passengers and crew. Five hundred were drowned, only two hundred of the passengers being rescued.
