The late Mrs. Lynn Litton.

Mrs. Lynn Litton, who has just died at her residence at Malvern, was one of the most widely read novelists of our time, but will be long remembered as one of the most pungent critics of our day.

She was born at Keewick on Feb. 10, 1823, her father being vicar of Crowthorne, and has mother the daughter of Bishop Bonham of Carlisle.

She was something of a travelling daughter, and spent more time among her father's well-stocked bookshelves than at home.

She early formed an ambition to have a career, which likewise occupied her family. For those times she was decidedly advanced.

She came to London when 22 years of age, and began her story writing with "Auntie the Egyptian." This she followed up with "Mimophone: A Romance of the Days of Pericles," which she brought out with the encouragement and advice of Walter Savage Landor. Among her best known earlier works are "Witch Stories," "Grasp Your Nettle," ("Misses"), and "Ourselves: Essays on Women." It was, however, with the publication in 1859 of "The True History of Joshua Davidson" that her name was really made; and in no long interval elapsed before this book was followed by "Cyrilla Konrad," "The Woman Well Lost," "Under Whitch Lord?" ("With a Shadow,"), "Christopher Kirkland," and "Sister Anna."

Mrs. Lynn Litton, even after reaching the ripe old age of three score years and ten, was still very busy with her pen. Till very nearly the last she worked hard, alternating her work with reading and rest.

Black Panther of Bangkok.  
The black panther at the Zoo in Bangkok, says the "Morning Gazette," made his escape recently while his cage was being cleaned. The alarm was given, and the bear, after killing a monkey which was tied to a tree, took refuge in the orchid house, underneath a rustic seat. The exclamation certainly behaved with great pluck, for cutting away some cross pieces above, having first closed up the sides with planks, they managed to escape away the earth from underneath each of his paws and hoofs them. A slip-knot was then thrown over his head, and he was dragged out, and frogmotted back to his den, where he was released from his bonds in an exceedingly hot temper. No one, strange to say, received so much as a scratch during the operation.

### THE WHEEL-WOMAN'S SKIRT.

Short Ones Permissible, But When Too Short They Inspire Disgust.

Addressing athletic women in the Ladies' Home Journal, Kilward B. Bok has some sensible suggestions regarding their costumes, and presents them very forcibly. "We need only look at some of the wheel women who ride over roads and paths with such grace, with skirts so short for a well-grown child of twelve years, to see how far and to what a vulgar extent this abuse has been carried," he says. "For a woman to be comfortable at her athletics she must have a skirt shorter than that which she wears on the street or in the house. But this does not mean that she should don a garment so scant as to leave her limbs exposed. It is bad enough when we see a very young girl in these abbreviated athletic skirts, but at least we can attribute it to a youthful indiscretion. But when an married woman was so far gone, that her husband would not let her go out, he had to make a hole so as to parade before the eyes of men in the short skirts which many of them affect, the sight is nothing short of disgusting.

Even more to be condemned is the custom which some women have adopted of donning short skirts as a regulation morning or afternoon dress. When, they really have no thought of athletics. Too often is it the case that women in these abbreviated skirts enter public dining-rooms or loiter around verandas in unwomanly attitudes. There is no more excuse for a woman to appear in a public dining-room in an athletic costume than there is for her to appear at breakfast in a delicate gown, or at the dinner-table in a riding habit."

### Herbert Spencer.


