> Mr. Jas. McIndoo, a former resident of Mariposa has returned from California whither he went in September last. He spent the winter in the Southern part of the state having charge of his cousin's orange grove located about 60 miles south of the city of Fresno. The grove was purchased from Mr. William Ramsay late of Orillia and embraces some 30 acres, the trees having been set out four years ago. Mr. McIndoo is not in love with the climate the country or the people. The days are hot and dry but nights cool; irigation is an absolute necessity to vegetation while the residents have not that Eastern veneration for the Sabbath and other things sacred to the ordinary Canadian. There is no grain raised in the section where Mr. McIndoo was while the crop in upper California this season was almost a total failure. A strange coincidence is to be found in the fact that the place where Mr. McIndoo received his mail was called Lindaay, perhaps named by some former resident of our town There are two rainy spells in the year but sometimes these are not very moist. Mr. William McIndoo paid \$6,000 for his 30 acre grove. He has been in California for ten years past, engaged in the dairy business, and made money. He keeps about seventy cows and supplies milk and butter to the residents of Fresno. There is a sort of clover hay grown called the alfalfa, which is often cut five times in the twelve months. Pumpkins and Watermelons are also quite largely grown in addition to tree fruits. There are thousands of acres of land in the state entirely unfit for settlement, sandy soil where nothing but sage brush and cactus grow.


