

'37-'38 is Mr. Isaac Rac, a former resident of this town, who now resides with his daughter Mrs. (Rev.) F. Johnson at Hastings. He is now in his 86th year, being 24 years of age at the time of the uprising.

In those early pioneer days justice was abstained on application to the council of "Court of Request," as it was then known composed of three members—Thomas Rac, his father, whose place of residence was one mile south of the present village of Reaboro, Col.
