The weight of the engarists increased during the menocurren considerably more than that of the non-tugarists. It was found also that a piece of sugar allayed hunger and enabled the sugar soldiers to march for a longer time than their comrades without faligue. 

The following sensible remarks, which we take from the Stratford Beacon, will apply as aptly to Lindsay as to Stratford, and to make its application more forcible we substitute the word Lindsay for Stratford where it occurs :

There are many Lindsay people, and people interested in Lindsay, who imagine that because they purchase goods or articles over some bargain counter in Toronto that they are really getting bargains. It is safe to say that, in the majority of cases, if these same persons took the cash to our local merchants, they would get similar or even better goods, at the same or even lower prices. Taking railway fare and other expenses into account, the bar gain hunter will be found to have much the worst of the bargain. If he or she were the only ones that suffered, that circumstance could be regarded with equanimity as a sort of retributive justice. Our Lindsay merchants are enterprising, they stock their stores with a variety of seasonable goods and cater to the local rent and taxes; they employ hands whose money is largely spent in to wn. They desire to have the trade of Lindsay and the families of the men that has not been traceable to drink. Other branches of business would not suffer by the abolition of the liquor trafte but would receive an impetue; forms of industry, now dormant for want of capital, would be established, and labor would find employment; the purchasing power of the people would be purchasing power of the people would be increased. 


