Glacier Ice.
The Paris Ice Company has conceived the idea of making some of the glaciers furnish the ice needed for consumption, the last winter having been so mild that their other resources failed, and they have accordingly laid the DuCasse glacier under tribute.

Reversible Shirt Bosom.
A Pennsylvanian has patented a reversible shirt bosom composed of four fronts, placed back to back in pairs and hinged together at the bottom, with loops for attaching them to the shirt, thus forming a shirt with four bosoms.

New Stanch for Blood-Flowing.
An original and efficacious device for stopping the flow of blood has for some time been used by the Chinese—a method, it is stated, still entirely unknown to the medical fraternity of this country and Europe. The plan is to use a sachet filled with charcoal powder obtained from straw, the application of these fine bags showing considerable advantage over the ordinary medicated gauze. The bags shape themselves perfectly over wounds and have a considerable absorbing power, while the case is almost nothing. They can be made, also, wherever they are to be used, and in a shape to suit each particular case, which is a fact of no little importance in using for field hospitals and surgical camps. In preparation, clean straw is taken, placed in a large vat, set on fire, and a cover, which closes hermetically, is placed on top; the combination of the straw is slow, and the product is, of course, aseptic—that is, devoid of microbes.

Shower of the Egyptians.
A German savant describes a comic pagurus, unique of his kind. The artist painted burlesque scenes in which cats and rats conduct themselves in a human fashion, quite in the Louis Vain manner, and the manners of cats are attributed to rats, and inversely. In the first sketch, a rat, dressed in a tuxedo, is served by a cat that is clothed as a slave and is presenting a mirror to the mistress. In the next scene a rat has the traits of a young Egyptian dandy, and an obsequious cat, having shaved him, places on his head a huge peruke. In the third sketch, a cat cradles in her arms a young rat in the manner of a nurse.

"The Horned Man of Winsford."
John White, known as the horned man of Winsford, died on Tuesday at his home, Stockstons, Winsford, Cheshire, says the Liverpool Courier. Deceased was bedridden 20 years, suffering from subcutaneous tumor in his head. Some years ago the tumor burst, and formed into a hard substance resembling sheep's horns, which was taken out and given to the Museum at Liverpool College, Liverpool. Since then another horn has grown. Several famous medical men interested themselves in the case.

Gratory in London's Hyde Park.
