Canada's State Functions.

Ottawa, Sept. 6.—The protest of the President of the Methodist Conference against the absurd and obsolete order of precedence which has been prescribed for State functions in Canada has attracted attention here. It is only the heads of the large dissenting religious bodies that have cause to complain of the anachronisms presented by this piece of musty mediaevalism. In a democratic country like Canada it is hard to understand why the real head of ohe Government should be ranked in Canada it is hard to understand why the real head of ohe Government should be ranked in the scale after the Archhishops and Bishops of the Roman Catholic and Anglican churches. The table of precedence for Canada was drawn up in the Colonial Office, and places immediately after the Governor-General, who comes first, the senior officer commanding her Majesty's troops within the Dominion. and the officer in command of the British North American station if of the rank of an Admirel. Ranking after these Imperial officers are the Ranking after these imperial emeers are the Lieutement Governors of the Provinces and Territories. Next in order came the Archbishope and Bishope according to seniority. There is no place for the Moderator of the General Assembly or for the President of the Conference, though at the State funeral of Sir John Thompson at Halifax the representatives of the Presbyterian and Methodist bodies were permitted to take rank with the dignitaries of the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches according to their emiority in office. It is not until the civil, military and religious functionaries have passed in the procession that the real head of the Goyernment—the Prime Minister—is permitted to wheel into line. The Premier is not designated in the list, but he merely takes rank as a member of the Cabinet. Another feature of this old-world relic that seems strange to Canadiane is that the officer commanding her Majesty's troops in the Dominion takes precedence over the Speaker and members of the Senate and the Speaker
