### Military Notes.

The comparative efficiency returns of the Infantry battalions who went to camp this year have been issued and we are pleased to note that the 45th old comrades-in-arms, the 46th battalion, head the list with a total percentage of 151.94, a mark far beyond any reached by its competitors.

Capt. Ronald Cockburn of the 3rd Dragoon, Peterborough, who has been trying to secure a place on the permanent forces of Canada, has applied to the British Government for a commission. His application has been favorably regarded by the war office and it is almost settled that he will leave for the east coast of Africa and will be stationed at Bechuanaland.

The militia department has sold 30,000 Snider rifles to a contractor for eighty cents each, together with a quantity of ammunition. The contractor is now retelling them like hot cakes at three dollars each, and, having only paid cash on half of them, he will soon realize his purchase money and make a handsome profit.

The Snider is a good weapon up to its limit of range, and most of the weapons disposed of were in good condition. There was a proposal made by a prominent military man not long ago that the Government should distribute these rifles and some ammunition among the farmers of the Northwest and along the border counties, in Eastern Canada, so that in an emergency arms of a uniform calibre would be available in these localities, and the owners would be more or less proficient in their use. There are very few farmers or townsmen for that matter, who would not cheerfully give up a dollar or two for a good hunting rifle and some ammunition. But the Minister of Militia took another method of getting rid of these rifles. The price paid is ridiculously low, and it would have been much better even if they had been given away to the farmers. The short rifles are to be retained for the use of the cadet corps.—Ottawa Citizen.

Much sympathy will be felt for Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Little of Kent street, in the loss of their six months old baby boy, who died on Monday evening.

Mr. Wm. Kennedy of Boboysgon, brother of Mr. Robert Kennedy of this town, died on Sunday evening. The deceased was very well known to many Lindsayers. He was Mr. Kennedy, is at present in a critical condition, suffering from an attack of typhoid fever.

Mr. Daniel Buck, sr., one of the oldest settlers in Haliburton county, died in Minden on Thursday last week in his 97th year. He emigrated to Canada in 1849 with his wife, Mrs. Kennedy. He afterwards lived five years in Ope and then moved to Minden, where he kept a hotel. Eventually he ran a saw mill in the township of Stanhope. For the past few years he lived with his daughter, Mrs. Graham at Minden.

Mr. L. W. Rose, the popular book keeper for the M. M. Boyd Company of Boboysgon, died last week. The deceased was only in his thirty-first year. He had just returned from a holiday trip, and was attacked with muscular rheumatism. He went to Toronto but medical aid could do nothing for him there, and he died next day. The funeral took place from his late residence in Boboysgon on Friday.

### In the Deer Haunts.

The busy season at the station this week reminded one of the stories of early Canadian days, when with axe and rifle the settlers went forth into the wilds of Ontario to hew out a space for their homes and to rid the woods of dangerous animals. Civilization has made such rapid strides into the Province that now those who love to experience what roughing it in the olden days was like and to shoot big game have to travel far northwards and then have to be content with shooting such innocuous and harmless animals as a melancholy looking deer, or perchance get a stray shot at some half starved and ancient bear that has so deteriorated that it seeks safety in some hidden corner at the first appearance of man. Hundreds of hunting parties went north this and last week from all parts of Ontario and the States, and all the northern trails have for once carried their full complement of passengers. Officials say that the number of people in the hunting grounds this year is larger than for several years past. It is to be hoped that they are not all dead sure shots, for, although the deer are said to be very plentiful this year, if each hunter comes out with his regulation number he will look as if there were some such in the saying that these graceful creatures of the Canadian woods will soon be exterminated. Not a few in the parties are devotees of the rod, and they carried all manner of fishing tackle.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Principal Harstone of the Collegiate Institute read his report, showing number of pupils on the roll for October to be 173, with an average attendance of 158. He drew the attention of the board to the coming visit of Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick, collector general of the Dominion, and Hon. G. E. Foster in connection with the Collegiate Institute. The latter part was referred to the committee on entertainment.

Principal Broderick's report showed 876 pupils on the rolls of the public school for October and average attendance 793.

A communication was read from J. H. Lindsay, asking permission to tap the South Ward school drain for his new house on the corner of E. Chancery and Cambridge streets. Referred to sites and building committee, with power to act.

The report from Principal Broderick, re work of the public school teachers for the past year, which was handed to Chairman McNeill, was not read but was referred to the finance committee.

L. C. L. CADET CORPS.

The chairman informed the board that the application sent to the minister of education regarding the cadet corps in connection with the Collegiate Institute had been approved and referred to Lt. Col. Otter. The latter will provide the officers. Lt. Col. Smith, of Toronto, who had been requested to give suggestions as to uniforms, had written, giving various schemes and plans for clothing the cadets. The chairman of the board referred them to the board. A special committee was then appointed, comprising Chairman McNeill, Col. Deason and D. R. Anderson, to take charge of everything in connection with the formation of the corps.

### GOVERNMENT GRANT DECREASES.

Chairman McNeill, who has written the Hon. G. W. Ross, minister of education, asking why the government grant to the Collegiate had been decreased, informed the board that the minister had replied, stating that the minister had the amount of the grant was due to the increase in the number of high schools and the extra grants obtained by the schools whose equipment had been very superior. Mr. Stewart thought that the minister's report on the school was unfair and that perhaps while the schools were modern as recently built schools, yet it would compare favorably with any of them.

TEACHERS AND PUPILS.

The board then went into a long discussion regarding the case of a little school girl named Miller in Miss Wet's room in the north ward school. The child had gotten into trouble for misconduct at school and the father took up his case, defending it against the teacher. The case was referred to Principal Broderick, who upheld the teacher, and was then taken up by Mr. Miller to the advisory committee of the school board who also upheld the teacher. Mr. Miller then appealed to the board. After some lengthy discussion in which no conclusion could be arrived at owing to the fact that all the parties concerned were not present, the meeting adjourned to the following evening when the facts were again gone over and the whole case reconsidered before all the parties. After all the evidence had been heard the board upheld Miss Wet in her action.

### SOMERVILLE.

COUNCIL PROCEEDING.—The Council met at Kilmount on the fifteenth of October. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The following By-Laws were read and passed in the usual way:—

A By-Law to provide for holding the annual municipal elections.

A By-Law to appoint collector for 1898.

A By-Law to confirm the award of the arbitrators in the matter of changing school section boundaries.

Accounts were ordered to be paid amounting to \$328.00.

Abatements on the Collector's Roll of 1897 amounting to \$570.04 were allowed.

The Clerk was ordered to notify the G. T. Ry. Co. to remove the old pier at the railway bridge out of the river.

The council adjourned to meet at Burnt River on the 15th of Dec. next.

The gas-testing apparatus in the inland revenue office in the post office building, placed there when the gas works were here, has been removed by Inspector Johnston.
