Town Council

Monday, Nov. 7.

Regular meeting, present, Deputy Mayor Smith (who had been appointed president of the council during the absence of the Mayor) in the chair, reeve Brady, deputy reeve Wilson, and councillors Burrows, Crandell, Graham, Mallon and O'Neill. The following communications were read:

- From Henry Irvine, asking for remission of Finance Committee.
- From John Murphy, to the same effect.
- From W. R. Tiffin, secretary of the fire and firefighters' association, acknowledging communication from clerk. Laid on the table.
- From W. R. Tiffin, superintendent of G.T.R. asking that he would shortly be in Lindsay and would look into the matter referred to by the council in reference to the Lindsay street crossing. Received and filed.
- From George Carr, asking for a reduction in his assessment. Court of revision accepted on account of diptheria in his family. Referred to the Mayor with power to act.
- From Samuel G. Parkin, in reference to the proposal to exempt the property of the Halton Company in Lindsay from full taxation on their property. Filed.
- A number of accounts were read and referred to the respective committees to which they belonged.
- Report of market clerk read. Tolls and weigh fees collected, \$270; certified to be correct by the treasurer. Filed.
- Report of October of the chief constable, and Licenses collected, \$31.50. Police Committee.
- Report of auditor for October read, certifying the correctness of the payments for the month. Filed.
- Report from the same officer, giving a statement of the year's revenue and expenditure, showing a surplus of \$3,056.57, receipts and expenditure for the ensuing three months being in part estimated. Filed.
- Report from town commissioner read, making several suggestions and recommendations.
- That the council memorialize the Ontario government to prohibit the manufacture of vehicles in Ontario for sale, unless they are 2 inches in width for vehicles carrying from 10 to 20 cwt., 3 inches for vehicles carrying from 20 to 40 cwt., and still wider for those of larger capacity.
- That the council prevent any connection being made with the sanitary or cellular sewerage system by any person or persons authorized to do so by the council.
- That different parties have been excavating the streets in different parts of the town for drainage, etc., and that this is a very unsatisfactory condition, and that it is necessary to prevent such excavations.
- That the council take steps to prevent such excavations.
- A. King in motion to procure supplies and tools, as members of the committee had objected to his getting one of the medical men to do the work on hand, without getting a requisition signed by the chairman of the various committees. The motion was carried.
- That the council also asked that his duties be defined by the council, as to when his authority begins and where it ends. He had asked on the 20th of June, for this to be done, but no action was taken.
- Called attention to the fact that his salary for four months had expired, but he had not received it. He had written several times to the council, but had no response. He was an engineer and clerk of works, being the highest number of officials employed on this class of work. Referred to board of works.
- The clerk read the official report of the reeve of the Syrester lot by-law, 500 for 85 cents.
- Dr. Burrows presented a petition, asking for the construction of a sanitary sewer on Bond street. Board of works with power to act.
- Dr. Brady presented the report of the special committee appointed to consider the matter of the G.T.R. Company as to further accommodations on Victoria Ave. Report adopted.
- Dr. Burrows presented the report of a special committee in reference to sending a competent man with Mr. Kitchener to investigate the timber supply that would be available in case the proposed veneer works be established here. Report adopted.
- Dr. Burrows presented the report of a special committee appointed by the town council to investigate the matter of the property committee, recommending that a by-law be passed for the better regulation of the fire brigade. Also a report of the committee of the whole on the recommendation of a partial exemption of the Rattray Company's property here from taxation. Report adopted.
