THE DEAD.

Charles Goodchild, driver, Boston Village, Toronto. William Lunness, driver and butcher, King street west, Toronto.

THE INJURED.

German boy, name unknown. Wm. Kinross, laborer, Prescott. Alex Walker, fireman, G.T.R., Belleville.

Murder at Beaverton

WILLIAM MERRAY, AN OLD MAN, FATHERED TO DEATH WITH A POKER AND A STRUCK WOOD.

No for many years has there been such excitement in Beaverton as was evinced when it became known on Tuesday morning that Wm. Merray, a well known citizen of the town, had been found in his house dead and apparently brutally murdered.

A GRIEVING SPECTACLE

The gruesome spectacle which presented itself will live long in the memory of those who saw it. Lying face downwards across the floor in a pool of blood, his head cut and battered into an almost unrecognizable mass, lay the unfortunate victim.

REASON THAT DEATH.

Looking around the squalid apartment, no evidence of a struggle could be seen, but later, on examination, beneath the stove was found a stick of stove-wood and a heavy iron poker, both of which had apparently been used in the perpetration of the awful deed.

SEVEN HOUR CURS.

October 24, Grant, who was of the party, immediately after County Crown Attorney Facewell, and empaneled a jury. The remains were viewed and a post-mortem examination held by Dr. James Tallaway, when no less than seven huge cuts were found upon the head, several of which had crushed into the skull, almost any of which might easily have caused death.

Deceased was largely connected in this section, but being of an eccentric disposition, preferred to live alone, residing with friends. He had been usually looked after by neighbors, and had small means upon which he lived. He was a very intelligent and well-read man, but, being upwards of 70 years of age, was feeble.

MONEY THE OBJECT. The object of the awful crime was evidently money, as the provisions obtained on Saturday evening remained untouched. No money was found about his person, on examination before the jury, while he was known to have been possessed of a purse on Saturday with a small sum of money.

Edward Killort, a 16 year old boy, who was arrested charged with the deed, has confessed, saying that the murder was the result of a quarrel. It is generally believed at Beaverton, however, that the object was robbery, as he has a bad record.

County Council in session.

The county council opened on Tuesday afternoon, Warden Lithgow in the chair and the following members present, Messrs. Johnson, Ryan, Shaver, Griffin, Graham, Fox, Bailey and Cameron; absent Messrs. Ellis, Austin and Dr. Wood.

THE WARDEN'S ADDRESS.

The Warden addressed the council in the following words:— Gentlemen,—In accordance with the procedure that has been followed in this county for many years, you have been called together at this time to close the business of the year, so far as it may be practicable, and to dispose of all matters that may be presented for your consideration.

In compliance with the government Order-in-Council, the clerk in the month of July advertised for applications for nomination as county assessor at the Ontario Agricultural College. One application only was received, on behalf of Mr. Robert B. Reid, of the township of Opa, and I have nominated him, subject to your approval.

Since June session a communication was received from John Austin, Esq., member for the Parish Division, calling attention to the impaired condition of the Union Creek bridge, on the boundary between the township of St. Maryville and the township of St. Peterboro. After examination of the bridge and correspondence with the Warden of the county of Peterboro, I authorized Mr. Austin to have such repairs made as were found to be necessary.

Early in the present month an earnest invitation was received from the secretary of Canadian Conference of Charities and Correction, for representation by the county at the conference to be held at Toronto on the 10th and 11th inst. As a subject was to be discussed in which all counties are especially interested, that of caring for destitute poor, by Mr. K. W. McKay, of St. Thomas, a gentleman who has had large experience in dealing with the unfortunate class, I deemed it due to the council that I should attend, and was accompanied at my request by the chairman of the county property committee and the assistant clerk. Subsequent to the public session, a meeting of representatives from counties was held, when the question of the establishment and maintenance of Houses of Refuge was discussed more in detail, and valuable information on various points was thereby obtained.

The different parts of the address were referred to the respective committees having power to deal with them. There were a large number of reports and communications presented, and many business transactions during the day, which, owing to lack of space, we are unable to report this week. A full report of the remainder of the week's proceedings will appear next week.

The Rev. Mr. McKinnon, the popular Presbyterian minister at Fenelon Falls, has received a call from the Presbyterian congregation of Lilliburg. He has submitted the call to the Presbytery, which will meet in Fenelon Falls on Tuesday next.
