County Council Proceedings.

Dr. Wood presented the petition of G. McFarlane, overseer of the township of Eldon, and forty-two other ratepayers of the township of Eldon, praying that steps be taken to place the approaches to the Talbot River bridge on the boundary between the counties of Victoria and Ontario on a suitable condition for ordinary travel. Referred to committee on roads and bridges.

His Honor J. E. Harding, Q.C., junior judge of the county of Victoria, who has recently entered on the duties of his office being present in the chamber, the Warden in cordial and fitting terms, on behalf of the council, extended to His Honor a hearty welcome to the county. His members of the council were then introduced by the Warden.

The report of the goal improvement committee was referred to standing committee on county property.

REPORT OF THE GOAL IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria.

GREEN STAFF. - Your Committee were appointed at the June session, following upon the recommendation of the Inspector of Prisons for the introduction of a water sanitary system in the County Gaol, and have the necessary plumbing done and to extend the sewer controlled by the County from William street to the river.

As soon as practicable after the adjournment of the Council, specifications were obtained and tenders asked for the plumbing and connection with the sewer tenders were received as follows: - W. G. Woods, \$209.00; W. G. Woods, with hot water, \$342.75; James Boxall, \$300.00; James Boxall, with hot water, \$330.00.

Your Committee decided that it was advisable that the hot water connections should be added, and the tender of Mr. Jas. Boxall was accepted and a contract was made that the County should pay a proportion of the cost equal to the estimated cost of the extension which the Committee was authorized to make, and the balance to be paid by Mr. Woods.

The Council of the Town of Lindsay having decided to construct a sewer on Francis street from William street to the river, an agreement was made that the County should pay a proportion of the cost equal to the estimated cost of the extension which the Committee was authorized to make, and the balance to be paid by Mr. Woods.

Following is a statement of the expenditure: - James Boxall contract, \$338.00; James Boxall, extras as agreed, \$8.38; Jas. Boxall, other work incidental to and not connected with contract, in closing old sewer, and in making connections of same with sewer, building partition in upper corridor, etc., \$33.80; Wm. C. Woods, services as Inspector, being 5 per cent. on \$338.00, \$16.90; Town of Lindsay, proportion of cost of sewer from centre of William street to the river, \$189.30; Town of Lindsay, cost of extension from centre of William street to the river, \$189.30; Total \$701.83.

Your Committee are pleased to report that all the works have been carried out in an efficient manner.

Your Committee are of opinion that the sewer on Francis street, from the junction of the new sewer westward, being a brick structure somewhat decayed and behind the requirements essential in a sanitary sewer, should be replaced by one suitable in all respects, but owing to the lateness of the season at which the other portions were completed, it was not possible to proceed with the renewal this year. All of which is respectfully submitted.

THURSDAY.

The report of the Kirkfield public library was referred to the committee on finance and assessment.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Graham, that the standing committee on finance and assessment take into consideration and report on the advisability of paying for the support of Thos. Fairer in the Home for the Aged. - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Graham, that the committee on finance and assessment be instructed to take into consideration and report on the advisability of erecting a County House of Refuge in the county of Victoria in the near future. - Carried.

The report of the standing committee on county property and general improvements was received and adopted, and also the report of the committee on printing.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Johnson, that the standing committee on finance and assessment be instructed to take into consideration and report on the advisability of paying for the support of J. Joseph Felow, of the township of Somerset, who is now in the Toronto hospital and pronounced incurable of the disease with which he is afflicted and if possible have him removed to the Home of Incurables. - Carried.

Dr. Wood gave notice that the next day he would introduce a petition to the honorable the Minister of Railways and Canals, praying that the lands in the county of Victoria, proposed to be flooded by the waters of the Trent Valley canal, be conveyed to the public, and that, before flooding said lands, as the experience of the past shows that if the timber

and brush be allowed to decay it will be a source of malarial fever for years to come.

FRIDAY.

The petition referred to in the preceding by Dr. Wood, was ordered to be engrossed, signed and sealed and transmitted for presentation.

The report of the standing committee on education was received and adopted. The report recommended the payment of the following accounts: - Wilson and Wilson, printing for inspectors, \$12.00; ditto, \$2; Board of Examiners, Entrance and Public school Leaving examinations, West Victoria, \$161.71; G. W. Beall, stationery for same, \$96.30; Board of Examiners, Entrance and Public school Leaving examinations, \$35.35; Board of Examiners, Entrance and Public school Leaving examinations, \$18.80. The committee learning that the Board of Education of the town of Lindsay had by reason made a reduction in the Collegiate Institute teaching staff from seven to six teachers, had effected a considerable reduction of the annual expenditure and that the saving was a definite one, not anticipated at the time of the last financial agreement between the board and the council, the committee expressed the opinion that the council was entitled to be allowed by the board a rebate equal to 36.7/10 per cent of the amount by which the annual expenditure was reduced in consequence of the decrease in the number of teachers.

On a motion of Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Austin, a petition to the Legislative Assembly praying that certain amendments be made to the Jurors' Act with a view to reducing the expenses for selection of jurors was read. It was ordered that the petition be transmitted for presentation.
