4. The laws of the Empire have a grand central unity, associated with an accomodating diversity. In the mother country, the colonies and the dependencies, there is the same rich variety of law, and the same strict subordination to one common authority. The House of Lords, or the Privy Council, in England, is the Supreme Court of appeal, which prevents the different laws coming into actual conflict.

The countries under the British Crown have all the right to invoke the inter-vention of this final Court of Appeal; but they are under no obligation to do so. The Parliament of the United Kingdom has supreme legislative authority, of which it cannot divest itself, over every part of the Empire, and has the right to make laws for all the colonies and dependencies. The exercise, however, of this universal power is limited by considerations of convenience and justice.

The three kingdoms, of which the mother country is formed, are themselves governed by different laws. Each has its own legal territory, its own courts, its own p coedure, its own unwritten and written

CUSTOM HOUSE OATHS.

well supplied with railways. Another commentory on the plea that "the day of canals is over" is furnished by Germany. The German government, whose Kiel canal between the Baltic and North Sea wes the latest great work of that kind, has decided to spend thirty-eight million dollars on a

new canal undertaking. It is a series of canal works to connect the Phine and Elbe, with branches to other natural waterways, and will enable water transportation to almost all parts of the empire. Yet Germany is already a network of rail-

Its local benefit will not be denied, but as one of the most direct and important outlets of the grain traffic of the great North west, which is becoming more productive every year, the prompt and speedy construction of the Trent Valley Canal receives its chief justification.—Peterborough Examiner.
