Rossland, B.C., Aug. 3.—Three big gold strikes were reported to day. The first and perhaps most important is on the Georgie laim, where a tunnel 120 feet long has peen out in a ledge of high grade ore at a depth of 100 feet from the surface. This ore ran \$40 per ton on the surface, and has improved 20 per cent, with this depth. This strike is near the east end line of the Monte Cristo, and is in the same ledge running through that claim. It therefore means also as much to the Monte Cristo as to the Georgie. The second strike is reported from Red Mountain, which is a claim situated between Cliff and War Eagle. Here ore running fairly well in gold has been found in a shaft down 40 feet. The third strike is on the Coxey claim, lying near the California on the west side of the Red Mountain. Good ore was found on this ground several days ago, but that just discovered runs much higer in copper, having about 20 per cent. of that metal and running well in gold also.
