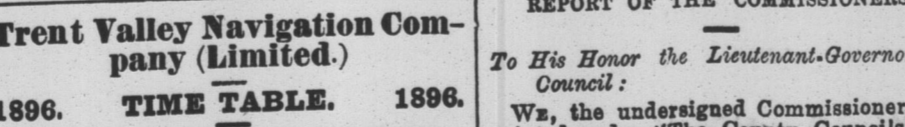

The County Councils Act, 1896.

Division of the County of Victoria.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS.

To His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor in Council:

We, the undersigned Commissioners appointed under "The County Councils Act, 1896" by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, to divide the County of Victoria into County Council Divisions, report, that having duly heard and considered all the evidence adduced before us, and having had due regard to the provisions of the said Act, we have divided the said County into Six County Council Divisions for the purposes of the said Act, as follows:—

1. The First County Council Division to consist of the Township of Mariposa.

2. The Second County Council Division to consist of the Towns of Lindsay and Polling Sub-divisions numbered One and Two of the Township of Ops, comprising all that part of the said Township lying west of the Sengou River.

3. The Third County Council Division to consist of Polling Sub-divisions numbered Three, Four, Five and Six of the Township of Ops, comprising that part of the said Township lying east of the Sengou River.

4. The Fourth County Council Division to consist of the Townships of Verulam and Somerville and the Village of Boboyagon.

5. The Sixth County Council Division to consist of the Townships of Fenelon, Beziely, Lenton, Digby and Longford and the Village of Fenelon Falls.

6. The Sixth County Council Division to consist of the Townships of Eildon, Garden, Dalton and the Village of Woodville.

All of which is respectfully submitted. Dated at the Town of Lindsay in the said County of Victoria, the Sixteenth day of July, 1896.

Thirty Now Have Pay Ore.

Roseland, B.C., Aug. 3.—Three big gold strikes were reported to-day. The first and perhaps most important is on the Georgia claim, where a tunnel 120 feet long has been cut in a ledge of high grade ore at a depth of 100 feet from the surface. This ore ran \$40 per ton on the surface, and has improved 20 per cent. with this depth. This strike is near the east end of the Monte Cristo, and is in the same ledge running through that claim. It therefore means also as much to the Monte Cristo as to the Georgia. The second strike is reported from Red Mountain, where a claim situated between Cliff and War Eagle. Here ore running fairly well in gold has been found in a shaft down 40 feet. The third strike is on the Corsey claim, lying near the California on the west side of the Red Mountain. Good ore was found on this ground several days ago, but that just discovered runs much higher in copper, having about 20 per cent. of that metal and running well in gold also. Income interest and shareholders has been caused by the astonishing succession of important strikes made in the last three weeks. Nearly 30 mines now have pay ore.

The New U.S. Government Look at Sault Ste. Marie Opened.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Aug. 3.—The new 800-foot government lock was formally opened this morning at 10 o'clock, when the big gates were opened and government boats Hancock and Andy Johnson and the river and harbor tug Antelope entered. The boats were crowded with invited guests, and 3000 spectators congregated on either side of the big lock to witness the event. The craft in the harbor had all of their bunting flying, and as the boats went on to the lock there was a pandemonium of whistles for at least five minutes. Intermediate and upper lock gates only were used. The chamber was filled in about 15 minutes, not all the valves being opened at first, and it was emptied in 10. The gate machinery worked well, the lower gates closing in three minutes. Col. Lydecker Lieut. Kavanaugh and other government engineers were on board the Hancock.

To Protect European Farmers.

Berlin, Aug. 3.—The Kreuz Zeitung says Austria proposes to create an international union to protect the central European grain producers against American competition. This proposal is made in view of probable future aggressive economic legislation on the part of the United States.

Electric Cars to Hamilton.

President McKenzie and Electrical Engineer McCullough of the Toronto railway company inspected part of the road between Long Branch and Hamilton Tuesday, and are to-day going abroad again to continue the inspection. The outcome of their examination of the road may lead to an electric car line from Toronto right through to Hamilton, under the control of the Toronto railway company. The track would, in all probability, be an extension of the present line to Long Branch, which would be continued up to the Dundas road.

It is not at all unlikely that in a few months Toronto will be able to go to Hamilton by street car.

FENELON FALLS.

From our regular special correspondents. The fire which broke out in the mill yard of Mr. Pudgey's saw mill a couple of weeks ago has been smouldering ever since in the saw dust and has had to be continually watched, but at noon last Saturday the flames burst furiously out again and our fire engine was called to the spot. It took a very short time to subdue the fire element, for if Fenelon Falls does not possess a steam fire engine or first class fire protection she certainly possesses many willing workers.

The steamer Alice Ebel passed south through our waters on Monday bearing in her train the dredge and other implements recently used at Resedale in the canal improvements. For some time our village has been suffering greatly for need of rain. Everything is burned or burning up, and the woods in some places beginning to assume the appearance of late autumn. A slight shower visited us on Tuesday night, but not sufficient to relieve the dry wells, thirsty fields and thirsty cattle.

The saying which has become prevalent here that all the largest fish are caught on Sunday was contradicted by the twenty-five pound "lumps" caught in Surgeon Lake last week by Mr. Ham, and by the catch on Tuesday of this week. On the latter day Miss Perry and Midge caught five most beautiful bass, and M. J. Simpson captured twenty-four of the finny tribe of the same order—bass.

The wheel which was placed in Howry's mill last week broke down again on Monday night, and as a result the mill was not running on Tuesday or Wednesday.

KIRKFIELD.

Ontario's Forest Lands.

The annual report of the Clerk of Forestry, just out, states that the province owns 51,200,000 acres of timber lands, that 21,000 square miles of land are under license. The annual growth is 90,000,000 cubic feet. The report recommends the withdrawal from settlement of certain lands where the young pine is springing up.

Got Out With Their Lives.

Whitby, Aug. 3.—The hotel at Whitley Junction Station, one of the oldest buildings in the town, owned and occupied by William Foy, was burned at 3 o'clock this morning. Mr. Foy and the maidservants, who were asleep, had time to escape in their night-dresses only. Mrs. Foy and the family are camping at Harbor Park. Nothing except two chairs was saved from the flames. The Whitley fire brigade with the steamer Merryweather responded quickly, but the building was almost entirely destroyed and this remote corner of the corporation could be covered. Insurance \$1500 on the building and \$1000 on contents.

An Important Judgment.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—A cable from London says: The Privy Council have given judgment in favor of Stewart in the celebrated case of Stewart v. McLean. The judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada was reversed by the Privy Council, and restoring the judgment of the Court of Queen's Bench and Superior Court. The case is regarded as of vast importance. It establishes the right of partners in insolvent concerns, after settlement with creditors, to be made, to claim on the estate for their share of the partnership, and to bear a relative share of losses. It is conceded here, too, that judges must have either failed to appreciate the facts or were, perhaps, overworked to such an extent as often results in ill-considered judgments.
