The recent heavy importations of Canadian delaine fleece wool, or rather combining Lincoln, Leicester and Cots-wold long wools, to Great Britain is an indication to our farmers what class of sheep to breed. Canada is credited on July 25th with some 45,000 bales in the English market, whilst the United States only sent at the same shipment some 9000 bales. The cause of this keen demand for Canadian long wools arises from the fact that owing to climatic influences we can raise the best long wools in the world. 
