TURKEY.

The carving cannot be much longer delayed. It now seems pretty clear that the recent massacres of christians in Armenia and Crete were perpetrated at the instance of the sultan himself.

Britain has finally decided not longer to play the part of other powers, but to leave the sultan to his fate. In Crete the christians—Greeks—have soundly thrashed the Turkish troops.

Britain and America should join hands and hearts as well as arms in a decided effort to establish a proper condition of affairs in Turkey.
