The Action was Dismissed

The action brought by Mr. Joseph Kennedy of Cavan, against the township of Cavan, for \$10,000 for loss sustained by the death of his wife who was killed by being thrown from her buggy on July 2nd, 1895, came up at Cobourg yesterday pefore chancellor Boyd. There was quite an array of legal talent engaged on the case. Messrs. R. C. Clute, Q.C., Toronto, and E S. Huycke, Cobourg, were for the plaintiff. Messrs. B. B. Osler, Toronto, and R. M. Rudy, Millbrook, appeared for the township of Cavan, and Messrs. A. B. Aylsworth, Toronto, and H. A. Ward, Port Hepe, for the third party, Mr. Thos. McCamus, who owned the farm opposite where the accident occured, and Mr. E. B. Edwards, Peterboro, for the third, Mr. Campbell, who was the tenant on the tarm opposite which the accident occurred. It will be remembered that the negligence for which the plaintiff claimed damages was in allowing fence rails to be left on the roadside.

The case was tried without a jury, being the first case under the new act whereby such actions affecting municipalities can only be tried by judge.

After evidence for the plaintiff had

been heard his lordship said there was

no evidence on which he could find that the defendants were liable. It was not shown how the death of Mrs. Kennedy occurred and it was not shown that it was caused by the fence rails which lay upon the side of the road imbedded in the grass and only rising one or two inches above the ground. Mourned as Dead.

Sarnia, Sept. 4.—The old saying that truth is atranger than fiction received another evidence last week in the experience of N. Simpson of North Dresden, who received in his mail a letter from a son whom he had mourned as dead for many years.

The young man, Orrin Simpson went off to seek his fortune some 5 years ago, and was last heard of 1892, when he wrote home that he had shipped on board a whaling ship, bound for the Artic seas. Nothing more was heard from him, but from another source came news that the whaling vessel had been wrecked, that only one boat load of the crew had been saved, and that young Simpson was not among the survivors.

By the letter now received it appears that the whaling vessel was wrecked as stated in the Artic ocean, near the mouth of the Mackenzie river. Another whaling ship of the fleet sent a boat to the wreck and took off some of the crew, but as the rescuing boat was short of provisions, she could not take all of the shipwrecked crew, and young Simpson and five others were left on the ship. They stayed on the shipwreck till their provisions were exhausted, and as no other vessel appeared to succor them they were at last forced to set out in the desperate endeavor to reach the

Three of them starved to death on the journey, but Simpson and two others survived and managed to reach the shore.

From the mouth of the Mackenzie river, where they landed, the three survivors set out to traverse the eighteen hundred miles wilderness which lay between them and the nearest settlement in British Columbia. This tremendous journey took them up the Mackenzie river to the Peace river, up the Peace river through the Peace river pass of the rocky nountains and across the wilds of Northern British Columbia to the coast, but they such ceeded in accomplishing the distance in safety.
At the coast young Simpson found employment in a salmon canning establishment, and by the first mail at the nearest postoffice he sent to his family in Dresden the letter which gave the welcome news of his safety.
