Collegiate Institute Notes. Last Friday afternoon the election of officers for the literary society took place. The excitement did not run so high as last term but this was owing to the comparatively small number of members.

Senior Leaving Certificate. Any candidate who passed in the subjects algebra, Euclid, trigonometry, composition, literature and history this year may in 1897, complete the examination by passing in (a) Latin and Greek or (b) French and German or (c) physics, botany, zoology and chemistry.

Junior Leaving Certificate. All candidates who have passed in arithmetic, grammar and history, may complete the examination in 1897 by passing in (a) Greek or (d) French or (e) German.

Public School Leaving Examination. Students who have passed the public school leaving examination are exempt from passing the Form I examination. After 1897 Form I examination will be discontinued and the public school leaving examination will take its place.
