London will make an effort to carry out that much thought of idea—that of forming an athletic association with \$25,000 paid-up capital, to control the sports of the city. The idea is a good one and should be followed by other towns and cities.

The wild fowl are flying south. The season for white fish and trout is closed. Hunters having more deer than they can use, need not be followed by the sportsmen. Lake is a favorite spot with duck shooters this season.

Mr. R. J. McLaughlin of town is hunting in the north with Fenelon Falls friends. A tremendous number of deer shooting licenses have been taken out this year. Deer must not be killed in the water or immediately after leaving it this year.

Mr. Dave Hudson of the east ward made a mistake in the close season for hantamens. He shot their collars this fall for a few dollars. \$10 will buy quite a quantity of apples, potatoes, pumpkins, turnips, beans, carrots and cabbages.

Mr. Bert Taylor of town, who is shooting with the Jackson party of Cambary had the honor to secure the first deer killed by the sportsmen. The deer is a fine one and was shipped to town Tuesday morning. Good boy Bert.

Mr. Robert Jay of town has been in Port Hope this week superintending the repairs on the M. R. R. engine house. Mr. Jas. Webster of Allandale, superintendent of the Lindsay and northern G. T. R. divisions was in town Thursday last week.

The C. P. R. car shops at Perth are now engaged in building 200 grain cars to hold 60,000 lbs. each. The fortnightly local refrigerator car service of the C. P. R. to Montreal has been discontinued.

The G. T. R. have issued a new complete time table, combining all matters connected with the present Grand Trunk railway system. It is really the best time table that the company have ever placed before the public.

The statement is made that in one year 372 men have been expelled from the brotherhood of locomotive engineers for intoxication, not by the railway managers, but by vote; the vote of local unions. Chief Arthur says, "No punishment can be too great for the man who steps on a locomotive intoxicated."

From R. J. McLaughlin, in regard to his application for a communication on mortgage loan.—A communication of a similar nature had been presented at a previous meeting, and was not entertained.—Finance committee with power to act.

Report of pound keeper read, nothing interesting during the last month.—F. V. L. Report of market clerk read. Fees etc. collected during the month \$65.61.—Town property committee.

Report of chief constable for October read: Fines collected \$22 40 Rent from Queen's square property 6 00 Total \$28 40.—Town property committee.

A communication from Jas. Goheen, relative to a defective drain, was referred to the street and bridge committee with power to act. Report of finance committee read, recommending the purchase of several accounts amounting in all to \$35.23; that no further action in the matter of the Midland loan and savings company be taken.

Report of town property committee presented, recommending that the offer of Dr. Burrows, re well, be not accepted, the committee feeling that it would be unfair to expend any money for the benefit of a few, but were in favor of allowing those interested to put down the pipe if they feel so disposed.—Report adopted.

Report of police committee read by the chairman, Mr. Brady, certifying to the correctness of the reports of the chief constable for August and September; in regard to fast driving over the bridges. The committee feeling that the signs at the bridges be repainted, and in case of offenders that they be summoned; that constable Reeves be granted two weeks leave, and his duties be performed by a substitute at his own expense.—Report adopted.

A motion was passed that the treasurer be authorized to pay the Light, Heat and Power Co. \$150 on account. Mr. Curtin called attention to a dam on the main canal on Caroline street, whereby the stream was diverted from its original course and was injuring the roadway. After a short discussion the matter was referred to a special committee, composed of the Mayor, Messrs. Jas. Graham, Touchbourn and Ray, with power to act.

A motion of sympathy with Mr. Thurston, councillor from the east ward, on his illness, was moved by Mr. Jay, seconded by Mr. Touchbourn and carried unanimously. Mr. Brady referred to the dilapidated condition of the old cemetery in the east ward, and moved, seconded by Mr. Pedlar that steps be taken to ascertain who owns the property, and the objects of having the few graves still there properly fenced in. The motion was adopted.

The by-law to revise and amend the standing rules of the council was introduced and after being read a first time, the council went into committee of the whole on the second reading. Mr. Keith's clause was granted on condition that the clause that provided that all officers of the council would be elected by ballot was reached. To this Mr. Brady objected, claiming that he should be appointed by an open vote, in which contention he was ably seconded by Messrs. Touchbourn and Ray, on the ground that the clause by substituting an open vote for the ballot was carried on a vote of 6 to 5, the remaining clauses were then quickly disposed of, when the council adjourned.
